100-YEAR OLD MAN PLANS TRIP WEST

John Sherritt Ascribes Longevity to Much Fresh Air.

London, Oct. 9.—"How does it feel to be a hundred years old?" Mr. John Sherritt, who resides at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Thomas R. Wright, 950 Princess Avenue, assured The Press yesterday that it feels "pretty good" to be a hundred and he ought to know for he passed the century mark on the 11th of last July.

It's a long period to look back over particularly if one is gifted with such a memory as Mr. Sherritt's, for he remembers distinctly events which transpired when he was a very little lad. But let nobody suppose that he lives altogether in the past far from it. He evidently shares the faith of Rabbi Ezra whom Browning quotes as saying "Grow old along with me, the best is yet to be, the last of life for which the first was made." He told the reporter that he had been contemplating a trip to Minnesota, in Manitoba, this fall, for in that locality he had enjoyed much sport with rod and gun in earlier days. The memory of the severity of the winters there made him decide to postpone his visit until next spring but he is forward to an enjoyable trip.

WATCHED WORLD'S PROGRESS To the fact that he has always spent much time in the open air Mr. Sherritt attributes his remarkable vitality, which keeps him in the full possession of all his faculties even at his advanced age.

He has lived through and enjoyed watching a century of unexampled progress in the world's history. He has seen the steam railway in his infancy and has lived to ride in automobiles and to see aeroplanes hovering over his dwelling. He is quite conscious of his privilege in this respect and displays surprising interest in the various modern inventions. But the invention which caused him the greatest astonishment and delight was the combined reaper and binder, now a familiar sight on every farm. In his day all the reaping was done with a hoe (or sickle) and the binding by hand. He was expert at this work and often as a lad of 13 in his native County of Cavan, Ireland, was considered exceptionally fast.

BINDER DELIGHTS. Later in this country, the binder came into use and he recalls that farmers and their families came miles to fields where a binder was at work to line its fences with tobacco in amazement.

Mr. Sherritt that he does not share the illusion that the "good old days" were better than the present time. In his own line of work, he is a shoemaker by profession and was in Blyth for many years, he admits that the shoes made by machinery today are a better all-around product than the old hand-made article. Nor does he think that the prices asked are so very much higher in proportion to what he thought of present-day fashions in ladies dresses he displayed a discretion doubtless accumulated through a century of experience and declined to commit himself beyond stating that they were "better." Whether or not he considered that the present styles left less to the imagination than in the old days he did not say.

MINING WORK IN THE ROCKIES

The gross value of British Columbia's mineral production for the year 1918 was \$41,782,474, an increase from that of the year 1917 of \$4,772,082, or 12.9 per cent, according to the annual report of the Minister of Mines. The gross value of the metallic minerals recovered in 1918 was \$27,910,278, which represents an increase of 2.3 per cent. The provincial mineralogist, Mr. Fleet, in his report, commenting on these figures, states that only once in the history of the province's mineral statistics has this output been exceeded and that was in 1916, when the year's mineral output amounted to \$42,290,462, only 1.2 per cent greater than in 1918. This is accounted for by the fact that 1916 was a phenomenal year with metal prices temporarily inflated, due to war conditions.

As compared with earlier years, he points out that the production of 1918 shows up even more favorably for it exceeds the next highest recorded production—\$42,440,800, made in 1912—by \$3,416,747, or about 29 per cent.

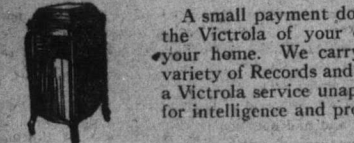
