

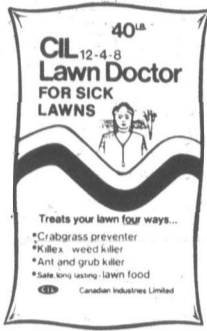
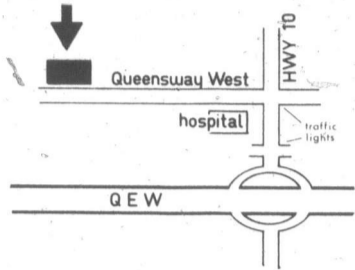

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Gun discharges youth wounded

A 14-year-old boy was wounded last week when a gun his 17-year old brother, was cleaning in their Paisley Boulevard home accidentally discharged.
Lawrence Leggo, 17, was cleaning a .22 calibre rifle which he believed to contain a blank cartridge.
When he inserted the gun's bolt it fired, sending several shell fragments into his brother's elbow. The brother was admitted to Mississauga Hospital.
Police described the wound as superficial. The incident, which occurred March 19 was investigated by police detectives Reginald Kaye and Edward Roulton.
No charge was laid in the unintentional wounding.

MPP's seat belt bill to get second reading

Peel South MPP Doug Kennedy expects a private members' bill he tabled calling for mandatory use of seat belts in automobiles to receive second reading during the present session of the legislature.
Kennedy said statistics show that 250 lives could have been saved if seat belts had been compulsory in 1971. In that year, 1,282 persons in Ontario died in automobile accidents.
He bases his statistics on the percentage of persons saved through mandatory usage in Australia.
"A significant reduction in fatalities and personal injuries would occur if everyone used seat-belts," he said.
Kennedy said he recognizes the problems of enforcement but hopes these will not become an issue because benefits of the legislation are so evident.
Private bills rarely go beyond a second reading but Kennedy hopes the measure will receive public support and finally Royal assent.

Motorcyclist killed after bike rams car

A 24-year-old motorcyclist was killed last Wednesday night after his bike struck a car on Highway 10 opposite the Peel County courthouse.
Andrew Kenneth Wright, of Pond Street in Meadowvale, was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital, then transferred to Toronto Western where he died about two hours later. He was thrown from his bike in the collision and broke his back.
The accident occurred at 8:15 p.m. as Wright was travelling southbound. A car driven by Joseph Valliquette 24 of RR 6 Mississauga came out of a driveway to make a left hand turn and go north on Highway 10. The car and the bike collided on the median rumble strip.
Mississauga police are still investigating the mishap and have yet to consult the crown. If no charges are laid, an inquest will probably be held.

Reprieve saves grant

A group of Malton youths received a last minute reprieve from Mississauga council Monday.
By passing a resolution to allow use of Malton Arena for a youth drop-in centre, council saved an Opportunities for Youth grant to the Malton Youth Organization.
Barbara McClean, 21, of 2118 Goreway Dr., told council her seven-member organization would lose its chance for the OFY grant unless council could guarantee a location for their drop-in centre by March 27.
Malton Arena will not be the actual site of the drop-in centre, but council wrote it into the resolution to save the grant.
Council told Miss McClean the town will find a suitable location for the activity before it begins May 14.

Chic doesn't like sprinklers

Mississauga council has referred to its building standards committee a London, Ont. resolution calling for the town to back a new provision proposed for the Uniform Building Code and the National Building Code requiring automatic sprinkler systems be established in all high-rise buildings.
Mayor Chic Murray, a high-rise dweller, said sprinklers will raise rents and "spoil the opportunities for decent looking ceilings."
"I don't think that would accomplish all we want it to do," Murray said.

Streetsville hotel scheme draws Mississauga fire

STREETSVILLE — The Town of Mississauga has once again officially objected to the Ontario Municipal Board over parking requirements for a 10-room hotel planned for Queen Street.
Mississauga had withdrawn an earlier objection when Streetsville asked the developer of the Franklin Inn to provide more parking.
Developer John Mason has been able to supply 35 parking spaces for the building which complies with a special by-law passed four months ago.
But, according to Mississauga Mayor Chic Murray, a similar structure in Mississauga would require more than 100 spots.
"If amalgamation goes through we don't want to be stuck with a building with not enough parking," he said.
Streetsville Reeve Bob Weylie said the by-law allowing the hotel is based on parking required for normal commercial usage in the town core area.
"We are working on two schemes to get municipal parking within a block of the site."
The hotel, to be modelled on the 1857 Franklin House, will have two dining rooms and two lounges in addition to the 10 rooms. Developer Mason plans a mid-eighteenth century accent with original town artifacts.
If approved, it would be the only hotel in town.

Park renamed after Speck heart donor

Stoney Bay Park will be renamed Richard Wolniewicz Memorial Park in honour of the 15-year-old Toronto boy whose heart gave the late Mississauga Mayor Robert Speck a few more months of life.
Wolniewicz was killed in a subway mishap and his heart was transplanted to Speck following a three-hour operation at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto Dec. 20, 1971.
Speck returned home for a few days, but his condition deteriorated and he died in hospital April 5, 1972.

Grant for recycling project

Mississauga council has authorized a \$600 grant to the Mississauga Recycling Committee to help initiate a recycling project in the town.
Council also approved use of town vehicles and staff for delivery of recyclable materials to purchasers with costs to be recovered from the proceeds.
Councillor Dick Withey had made the proposal to council and also proposed a resolution, which was passed, calling for bids on all town purchases of stationery and other paper products to include alternates using recycled paper.

Hospital chairman

A. G. Rodgers, administrator of North York Branson Hospital, has been elected chairman of the management advisory board of Lakeshore Psychiatric Hospital.
Lakeshore is the first Ontario psychiatric hospital to have an advisory board responsible for planning a change in administration that will transfer executive authority to a board of directors.

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
