MAD DOGS

Judge Houston Offers a Valuable Suggestion to the Council Re Dogs Running at Large.

"The City Council should not promptly in the matter of dogs running at large," remarked Judge Houston this morning. "As far as we know there are no mad dogs in Chatham now, but we should not wait until we have them before we take steps to protect our citizens. Now is the time to act, and it would be a good move if the Council at their meeting to-night would provide for some by-law, working under which the police would be able to prevent dogs running our streets. London has learned from experience and now they have passed a law to regulate this evil. Some years ago we had a dog pound here, but the pound-keeper was not paid enough money to take an interest in his work and the pound was sold. This, however, is a good idea to impound all dogs found running at large and have them shot in 48 hours if the owner does not claim it. Now that the hot weather is coming on something should be done right away."

JUSTICE FOR ALL

Chief Holmes Explains a Few Things in Connection with a Case That is Interesting Many.

"If the man who wrote the letter to the Planet on Saturday—saying that he did not think the Police gave that half-witted woman justice—were acquainted with all of the particulars of the case, I do not think he would be so anxious to rush into print," remarked Chief Holmes this morning.

"As a matter of fact we investigated the case fully and could find no evidence against the people on Lacroix St. who employed this woman, except what is said by the woman herself, and her mind is plainly unbalanced. The man on Lacroix St. says he made a bargain to give her \$4 a week for the first week, a reduction after that, and he has lived up to his agreement. When the woman went back later she started screaming around for her money, and the man merely pushed her away and closed the door. There was no violence used whatever, and we can find no one who will say that the half-witted creature was badly used, if anyone who knew of any agreement will come and give us grounds for laying an information we will be only too well pleased to help him get her money, if there is any coming to her."

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DECORATION

The Independent Oddfellows Do Fitting Honor to Their Deceased Brethren—Attend Church in the Evening.

The Independent Order of Oddfellows yesterday afternoon decorated the graves of those of their number who have joined the great advance guard and are now sleeping in Maple Leaf cemetery.

Marshaled by Wm. Tuttle, the Lodge left its rooms about two p. m. 375 strong and headed by the Citizens' Band, rags conveying those of the veterans who were unable to walk. A large float was smothered under the flowers which were to be placed on the graves.

The Lodge has its own plot in which are buried friendless members of the Order. This plot has been well cared for and looked splendid in its green garb. In the centre of this special altar had been erected and there the memorial services took place, conducted by Noble Grand W. A. Potter and Chaplain J. McCorvie. Between each part of the service the band played an appropriate hymn. After this the Lodge was divided into sections, each section visiting one of the fifty-nine graves of deceased members of the Order in different parts of the cemetery. On each a flag was planted and flowers placed.

After returning to the lodge rooms speeches were made by Wm. Potter, John Turner, Arch. McCog, M. P. P. Mayor Cowan, Sam. McCormick and John Davidson. A hearty vote of thanks was passed N. C. Gibson and the other members of the committee having charge of the parade, who worked so ardently to make the occasion a success. Another vote of thanks was passed Caretaker H. Turner for the help he had given the committee in locating the graves of the deceased brethren.

The deceased is a Logan Scotchman, 70 years of age, coming from Berkshire, near Rainbow, and spoke with a pronounced accent. Known as a brother-in-law, and the wife of Andrew Ross, of Dover Township, is a niece. Both were notified and arrived in the city about 11 a. m. Mr. Urquhart said that the drowned man had told another employee of his intention to come to Chatham and return about four o'clock. That was the last seen of him.

Dr. Ray was called out of the city this morning, consequently it has not been decided whether an inquest will be necessary. The funeral will take place to-morrow at 2 p. m. from the residence of Mr. Ross.
