London, Nov. 5, 1908.

Dear to the heart of the British boy—one cannot but pause, as one notes the date, and think of the changes which have come over the status of the Church in this land since the time when not so many years ago the Romish Pope used to be the favorite image that was hawked round our streets on this anniversary, and burnt with immense glee on Hampstead Heath.

The English pilgrimage is over, and slowly the returning pilgrims are making their way back to their native land, many pausing en route to feast upon the wondrous ark treasures of Florence, or wander down the silent highways of Venice that "glorious city in the sea."

Although here we have none of the picturesque and touching customs which mark All Souls Day abroad in the great Catholic cemeteries such as Pere La Chaise, etc., yet the day is not allowed to pass without an earnest remembrance of those vanished ones who are so near to the majority of us who have lived long enough in this world to experience the pain of loss.
