IIr. President, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council : Lir. Speaker, and Gentlemon of the House of Assembly :

The lamented indipolition of our Venerable KING, remains unchanged; and it is with infinite regret, I have to announce the Death of Her Majefty the QUEEN.

Her. Majefty died on the feventeenth day of November, after a tedious illnes, which the bore with the most pious fortitude and relignation.

In this National Calamity, the general feeling of forrow has been foftened by the inform approach of the event; and by the pleafing reflection, that it is not until after a very long reign of fifty-feven years, and when verging upon the utmost limit of life, that Her Mojesty has closed Her earthly career, amids the tears of Her children, and the bleffings of Her people.

Nour firm and affectionate attachment to the Illustrious Family on the Throne, will, I am confident, join with me in prefenting our deep and fincere condolence to His Royal Highmets the Prince Regent, and the Royal Family, on this forrowful occasion; expressing our just fense of the exalted virtues which have diffinguished Her late Majefty through life, and which have left her memory to grace the page of Miftory, as a model of pre-existent excellence.

The General Affembly of this Province, perhaps, never met under circumfances that afforded more folid grounds of congratulation on the flate of the Country, than it does now. The diffrefs that prevailed two years ago, is no longer felt any where ; fucceeding years of abundant crops, have, under the bleffing of Providence, diffelled the clouds that hung ever us, and I have had the fatisfaction to obferve increasing posperity in all parts of the Province. In these two years, our agriculture has been cheered up, our Filherize have been fuccessful, and our Commerce is reviving under the influence of an Order of the Prince Regent in Council, by which the Port of Halifax has been declared, to a certain extent₂, a Free Port.

A Copy of the Order of His Royal Highnels shall be laid before you; and I cannot doubt, but that this measure, which promifes great advantages, will be received as a frech inflance of the watchful protection of His Majefly's Government over the interests of this Province.

In committing to you the general discussion of Public Affairs, there are some points which call for my special recommendation to your attention: these I shall merely name at present, and explain myself more fully upon them in the progress of the Sassian.

The fystem now adopted for the improvement of the Roads throughout the Province, appears to me to require material alteration.

The Militia Laws alfo, I have found, in fome points, ill fuited to our circumfances : what I would fuggeft on that head, has in view to reduce the numbers, and to make that fmaller number more efficient.

I shall call your attention to a measure tending to animate the general spirit of improvement in Agriculture; and I will submit to you the plan of an Institution in Halifax, in which the advantages of a Collegiate Education will be found within the reach of all classes of Society : and which will be open to all sects of religious persuasion.

The circumftance of meeting you for the first time in this place, leads me to congratulate you on now occupying this fplendid Building—erected for the reception of the Legislature, the Courts of Justice, and all the Public Offices. It stands, and will flands, Lippe, to the latest posterity, a proud record of the Public Spirit, at this period of our Hilbory : And as I do confider this magnificent work equally honorable and useful to the Prevince, I recommend it to your continued protection.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly :

I have ordered the Public Accounts to be laid before you : I truft you will Ead caufe to approve them.
