

OTTAWA, Dec. 7-As the Premier's defeat was overwhelming, and he says he accepts the verdict of the people, it is expected that he will place his resignation in the hands of the Governor-General at once. The latter will then ask Mr. King to form a cab-

inet. No greater political revolution has ever taken place as the result of a Canadian general election. The Premier and eight of his colleagues were defeated at the polls.

In Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Manitoba and Saskatchewan no Conservative candidate was elected.

East of the Ottawa River and west of the Great Lakes, Conservatism, as a political force, has ceased to exist, save in the urban centres of British Columbia.
