Herring, the aeroplane inventor, yesterday told a story in regard to the publication of the discovery of a correspondence between himself and Matthias Arnot, a wealthy young man of Elmira, N. Y., that Arnot was responsible for the flight of the ideas embodied in the Herring-Curtis machine.

"I had already built and tried out gliders successfully before I began working with Arnot. I would not permit my capital with which to carry on experiments. His ideas were far in advance of his day. He offered suggestions that will be embodied in the final solution of the problem."
