

Liberal Corruption in the Saskatchewan Election Shown Ep-Francistse Bill Talked Out.

Ottawa, April 20 .- (Special.) -- Mr. Davin was instrumental this afternoon n exploiting what he characterized as he alarming and disgraceful state of hings in Northwest constituencies. er ecially mentioning that of Saskatchewan, in which more than one Minister of the Crown was implicated. In June last Mr. Laurier was elected by a small majority there. There was evidence enough to upset the election, but the Conservatives decided not to disturb him in his seat. When Mr. Laurier decided not to sit for the constituency a fierce fight arose. ernment would not press it this session, but that during recess a serious attempt would be made to devise a more practical measure.

Sir Charles Tupper, continuing, after recess, characterized as extraordinary and undesirable the provision which called upon a judge to decide a question of moral culpability, or whether a certain act affected the result of an election. The whole tendency of the bill was to open the door to irregularity and corruption. The best The Globe itself could say for the new Act was that it would be no more objectionable than the present system. The trend of public opinion was towards manhood suffrage and one-man-one-vote. That was the law in Nova Scotia in 1859. The electorate of Canada was sufficiently intelligent to be entrusted with manhood suffrage. He would recommend some such simple and uniform system. It was base ingratitude of the Liberals to quarrel with the present law. Under the provincial franchise they had been beaten seven times, while out of three elections held under the Dominion franchise they had won one without a policy, without principles, with nothing but the prestige of their leader, although he admitted that was a good deal. 


