In this province especially the public demands its paper on Sunday morning, and is not content to wait until Monday to learn what happened on Saturday. The effect of the prohibition of the Sunday paper would simply be to increase the Canadian circulation, already too large, of the American daily papers, and further embarrass and harass the Canadian newspapers which have to meet this competition, which comes in most cases from cities much more populous and better provided with telegraphic and other facilities for news gathering.

If Mr. Charlton's aim is to discourage newspaper enterprise in Canada nothing could be devised better calculated to effect this end than the pending bill, but if his aim is to preserve the public morals he should devote his attention to excluding vicious American publications, and to the encouragement of wholesome newspapers in the Dominion.
