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GERMANS SIGNAL AUSTRIAN FLEET FROM A BREWERY

All Germans in an Italian Brewery Arrested as Spies — Railway is Damaged by Severe Shell Fire.

Milan, May 26.—Via Paris, May 27

—Destruction of the railroad-junction evidently was the object of the bombardment of Ancona by an Austrian squadron which raided the Italian coast Monday, according to additional details which have been received here.

The warships appeared off Ancona about midnight, accompanied by two aeroplanes which flew over the city. The bombardment began at three o'clock and continued two hours. Shell of all sizes were fired. The guns were trained not only upon the railroad yards but upon the military hospital, the Bank of Italy and two barracks. The cupola of the cathedral Apse was damaged.

Slight damage to the railroad was caused by shell fire between Porto Recanati and Porto Civitanova. The Austrian warships retired from Ancona when an Italian fleet appeared. Because of reports that the Austrian squadron had been signalled from an Ancona brewery, all Germans employed there were arrested as spies. CHARGED WITH TEMPORIZING

Rome, May 26.—via Paris, May 27. Commenting upon the proclamation of Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria with having adopted in 1859 a temporizing and threatening policy in the hope of averting hostilities, Piedmont answered by crossing the Ticino River "which led to the brilliant victories of San Martino and Solferino."

Skilled Mechanics are Wanted For Gt. Britain

Ottawa, May 27.—George N. Barnes, British Labor member for St. George's, and W. Wyndham, representing the British Board of Trade, who have been commissioned to secure skilled mechanics on this side of the Atlantic for the munitions factories in Great Britain, held conferences with the Canadian Shell Committee yesterday afternoon and with members of the government. They also addressed the Myors' Congress in the morning and explained the reason of their visit. Skilled laborers accustomed to handling metal and working on lathes who desire to go will have their fares paid to England, and will be insured the highest rate of pay. If they stay six months they will be entitled to a return fare.

WONT TAKE THEM IF NEEDED HERE. Mr. Barnes, however, states that he will not take men of this class from the Dominion if any objection is advanced by the government here, and it is not thought likely that many men from Canada. Men of the class which appears to be desired by the British government are not, as a rule, on the unemployed list in Canada at present, and the munitions factories, steel works and manufacturing plants, engaged in making shells, gun-carriages, etc., are at present running pretty well to capacity, and, therefore, need their men.

PREMIER'S ANNOUNCEMENT. To the Mayor's delegation yesterday, Premier Borden stated that \$200,000,000 of orders had been placed with Canadian firms by the Canadian Shell Committee, and that these firms were employing many skilled laborers. In addition it is announced that the Dominion Steel Works of Sydney, Nova Scotia, has commenced the manufacture of a high explosive substance of

great powers of expansion, which is a by-product of the coke-ovens. It is further stated that the Algoma Steel Company, at Sault Ste. Marie, will also manufacture the requisite quantity of this substance at an early date.

COPPER, ZINC AND BRASS. Arrangements are also well under way for the refining under Government auspices, and possibly with government assistance, of copper and zinc mined in British Columbia, and for the manufacture of brass in the Dominion. At present the copper from British Columbia mines is shipped across to the United States, in the face of a freight rate of \$10 per ton and of a heavy duty. It is estimated that the cost of refining the heavy freight rate when reimported into Canada. It is computed that at Trail, B.C., a refining plant could be established for a million and a half dollars, and that the cost of refining the copper and manufacturing the brass would be more than compensated for by the saving in price of the manufactured article. This is the first time that the shells being made here which is not manufactured in Canada at present.

Gun carriages are also being made in the Dominion, and guns assembled. SKILLED MECHANICS CANNOT BE SPARED. The Dominion is, therefore, it will be seen, fast becoming an important manufacturer of munitions, and it is doubtful whether skilled mechanics in any number can be spared. Certain classes of artisans and laborers are out of employment, but not many of the class desired by Mr. Barnes. It is stated that 30,000 skilled mechanics are required, and Mr. Barnes states that he does not expect Canada to supply a very large proportion of these.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
