At Osgoode Hall recently, Mr. Jus-
tice Maglen dismissed a motion to
quash the conviction of the Warne
Drug Co., of Peterboro, which was
fined for selling patent medicine
known as Wilson's Invalid Port Wine
containing more alcohol than allow-
ed by the Ontario Temperance act.

In the course of his written judg-
ment his lordship said: "I am sat-
isfied, upon the evidence which was
adduced in this case, that the com-
pound in question is capable of be-
ing used as a beverage and has ac-
tually been used as such on various
occasions and by different people,
and am unable to interfere on this
motion with the conclusions reach-
ed by the police magistrate."

During the latter stages of the
city council meeting last night, a
resolution was introduced by Ald.
Harp regarding the sale of govern-
ment fish but it met with opposition
from certain quarters of the council
board, several aldermen taking the
stand that the municipality need not
approach the government, but that
the individual dealers could make
negotiations. Before the discussion
was concluded, and a vote could be
taken, the councillors had drifted
away until there was no quorum.

In support of his claim that the
municipality will have to take the

"The distribution of fish is under
the supervision of Mr. S. L.
Squire, officially known as the Dis-
tributor of Fish for the Ontario Gov-
ernment. The distribution of govern-
ment fish is done through the munici-
palities, which, if they do not wish
to handle the fish themselves, may
name dealers in local districts who
will handle the fish. The govern-
ment bills the municipalities and the
municipalities in turn bill the local
dealers. In this manner the treas-
ury of the municipality is responsible
to the government for payment, and
the government thus avoids much
trouble in this connection."

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INVALID WINE NOT FAVORED

From the Ontario License Depart-
ment, Inspector R. J. Barrett has re-
ceived a letter informing him that at
present an investigation is being con-
ducted into the manufacture and sale
of invalid wine, which exceeds the
2 1/2 per cent allowed under the On-
tario Temperance Act. These wines
however are medicated but it thought
that the medication may, in some
cases, be merely a cover for the
sale of the beverage. The manufac-
turers and not the druggists will
probably be the victims should any
proceedings be instituted, but In-
spector Barrett is of the opinion that
the attitude of the Department con-
stitutes a warning to the dealers who
are handling the tonic to unload
their present stocks as rapidly as
possible.
