A commercial organization composed of Dawson business men has taken up the work of opposing tha Treadgold concession

The plan adopted was such as would naturally commend itself to intelligent, public spirited men whose zeal for the community overrides any mere personal aspirations.

A petition was drawn up and cir culated with such success that in matter of ten days 4000 signatures had been secured. On every creek in the district where the document was presented-and it was only due to lack of time that all the creeks were not reached-every eagerness was displayed by the miners to attach their signatures thereto. The petition having been prepared and circu lated was forwarded immediately to Mr. Ross, the territory's representative in parliament and the proper person to receive it.
