UNIONVILLE.

The successful business man who advertises and makes money starts out immediately to find the newspaper man and says a word of grateful acknowledgement in his ear. Then if the puffer only took something how pleasant it would be for him to have the publisher take a smile, and how pleased the hands about the office would feel to see the two start out and walk thoughtfully down the street together, and the business man is supposed to take sugar in his teeth to take a clove or two, and life appears sweeter and peace settles down like a turtle dove in their hearts. We don't know that we would have allowed our thoughts to run in this direction were it not for the streets last Saturday night. Business had been good during the week. Two or three long standing subscription accounts had been paid in to our coffers and there was no pressing dues pigeon-holed for future consideration.
