SACRED MUSIC ON SUNDAYS.

We quote from an editorial which recently appeared in The Congressionalist, as right to the point:

"The public park is the people's garden, and who can look without pleasure on men who rarely see their families together during the working days, with wife and children around them in the midst of growing things of nature on a summer afternoon? Music, such as is appropriate in the home, adds to their happiness, and the public spirit that provides it is akin to his who had compassion on the multitude.

"To provide what the people need for useful Sabbath, especially in crowded cities, requires that many should labor. It is our duty to see that such labor is limited to service in providing a helpful Sabbath for others, and that those who thus work shall have compensation in rest. To discharge this duty calls for sympathetic study of social conditions, forbearance with those who differ from us, and a firm determination to preserve the Sabbath for the highest public good.

"Christians should support such Sabbath legislation as will secure the most healthful use of the day for all classes. The ideal Sabbath is the one which secures physical rest, mental recreation, and spiritual renewal. The question how we can help the community to attain to this ideal calls for study, and the answer to it will vary in different communities."

KITCHENER THE COMING MAN.

The Toronto News takes the following view:

"The reception given Lord Kitchener on his arrival in England from South Africa on Saturday, was enthusiastic, and shows that the man who so successfully ended the war is the hero of the hour.

He is a strange hero, this man of iron, who gives as much heed to the acclaim of the multitude as he has given in the past to his blame and criticism. His steadfast ability has at last won for him the public recognition which his strength and disregard of powerful official influences lost him in the past. The hero of Khartoum might have been the idol of the hour had he so wished, but Kitchener would have none of it. Those who admired his ability as a general disliked his outspoken and caustic strictures on the established order of things. He was looked upon with suspicion and distrust in officialdom, and it was only when he was urgently needed that he got his chance in South Africa. He made good; he always does. Now he has a chance of again being the idol of the hour, this time among the people—the common people—who have come to know him. In officialdom he is feared and hated.

But he is coming—this man of iron—coming as irresistibly as the seasons come. The British War Office is known to be in a shocking state of irresponsible confusion. Its condition is a menace to the efficiency of the army and the safety of the Empire. Lord Roberts, great as a general in the field, has utterly failed (in the high administrative position of commander-in-chief. He has been unable to resist the influences which keep idiots and imbeciles in important offices. The existing inefficiency has been too strong for him.

Kitchener would soon offend royalty as not if he necessity lay in the path of duty. He would lay bare the sore spots, though in doing so he earned the hate of half England. He has the soul, the methods of a Cromwell, this man of iron. In South Africa he cleaned out the army and sent dukes and lords home to dance attendance at St. James'. He will be commander-in-chief for long, and when he is his genius for administration and utter imperviousness to

SCIENTIFIC MURDER.

There died on Sunday night, July 13, near Dover, N. J., Miss Emma H. King, a young woman who allowed herself to be inoculated less than a year ago with the germs of consumption by Dr. Geo. D. Berney, of Brooklyn, in order that the latter might prove his theories regarding tuberculosis. The young woman committed suicide by taking arsenic, having become a mental and physical wreck, it is said. She told that she had been inoculated with consumption and that she had tried to cure her and she had taken lots of medicine with that object, but without success, and she had worried over it ever since. She is spoken of as a martyr to science, but it is doubtful if science is in need of martyrs gained in such a manner. To plain people it would seem that her inoculation ought to be held to prison on a cold-blooded, practical, old-fashioned charge of murder. Dr. Berney has been carrying on the inhuman practice of vivisection to an extreme that ought to be injurious.

TREATMENT OF THE CORONATION CONTINGENT.

The coronation contingent has returned home from London, whither it went to do honor to the King at his coronation, which did not eventuate, and with it has come the emphatic denial of the stories, printed in some Canadian newspapers, of indignities offered the Canadian soldiers during their stay in England.

It was with feelings of surprise and anger that Canadians heard, from what seemed to be an authoritative source, that all sorts of indignities were being heaped upon Lieut.-Col. Pellatt and the officers and men under his command by the War Office and those in charge of the coronation pageant.

Now we learn, from the very men who were supposed to have suffered under shameful indignities, that they were treated like princes and shown every honor, and that the stories printed in Canada about their ill-treatment were false in every particular.

This sort of newspaper enterprise cannot be excused on any ground. It is calculated to do infinite harm, and serves no good end.

International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow: The Ten Commandments—Ex. 20, 12-17.

Golden Text—"Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

Read the Lord Jesus Christ's commentary on this lesson in his sermon on the mount, Matt. v., 6-7. These commandments are as much the will of God for his creature, man, now as the day they were first spoken, and what a happy condition if men were governed by God's will and not by the world, the flesh and the Devil. Would to God, when we see our sinful reflection in God's law we would turn to the Lord Jesus. God does not cleanse us by His law, but by blood and fire, the washing of regeneration and the renewing of the Holy Spirit. This brings us into real harmony with the will of God as expressed by His law. Love is the real bond of unity, purity and power in the individual, the family or society. Living by love is keeping the commandments in covenant with eternal goodness, and no man finds them either unreasonable or impracticable when he is possessed by the Holy Spirit of God. They are written by God now, "not in tables of stone, but in the fleshy tables of our hearts." Our first duty towards man is to honor our parents. Parents should represent God's authority to their children, to honor and submit to this God-appointed authority is the first lesson a child should learn—"without it, all the voyage of their life is bound in shallows and in miseries."
