## JAPS PRESS KUROPATKIN.

Fighting Was Fierce, But the Japanese  
Were Repulsed.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 28.—General  
Kuropatkin, telegraphing a description  
of a Japanese attack on Nov. 24,  
against a Russian detachment near  
Einkherchen (Yensientien), on the  
front of the left flank.

"The fighting," Gen. Kuropatkin  
says, "was fierce, almost amounting  
to bayonet engagement; but the  
enemy were everywhere repulsed and  
suffered severely. The attack was re-  
newed the following morning, the  
Japanese having been reinforced, but  
again was repulsed, and at four  
o'clock in the afternoon a blizzard  
and fog greatly hindered the artil-  
lery. The Japanese continued to ad-  
vance, under cover of the fog, but  
our forces held their positions and  
the firing subsequently slackened. The  
Russian losses were nine killed and  
57 wounded."

"On Nov. 26 the Japanese resumed  
the offensive and endeavored to  
develop our left flank whilst advancing  
against our centre."

"I have received no later reports."  
Gen. Kuropatkin also describes the  
bayonetting of 20 Japanese belong-  
ing to a patrol who were the recon-  
naissance the night of Nov. 25.

**Russian Repulsed.**  
Tokio, Nov. 28.—Manchurian head-  
quarters, reporting yesterday, says:  
"From the night of Nov. 25 until  
the morning of Nov. 26, a body of  
the enemy's infantry attacked our  
troops in the vicinity of Sintangun  
and Shashoua, but the attack was  
completely repulsed by us."

"The enemy's artillery, posted to  
the east of the To Mountain, vigor-  
ously shelled the vicinities of Man-  
chuantan and Kuchiatzu, from two  
o'clock in the afternoon of Nov. 26,  
but we suffered no damage."  
"On the right flank the Hun  
River, a body of the enemy's cavalry  
attacked Manchies, on Nov. 25, but  
was driven back by our force."  
"On Nov. 24 the enemy set fire to  
Shantailima, and most of the village  
was burned."

**To Meet Battle Fleet.**  
London, Nov. 28.—The progress of  
the Russian second Pacific Squadron  
excites daily growing interest. A  
Japanese correspondent of The  
Morning Post, discussing possible  
preparations to meet the squadron, sug-  
gests that Japan relies upon the  
older warships to maintain the  
blockade of Port Arthur (in fact,  
the correspondent asserts they al-  
ready are so employed), and thus en-  
able Togo to release his more mod-  
ern vessels for overhauling at Sase-  
bo, preparatory to meeting Admiral  
Rojestvensky.

**Fresher Opposes Prohibition.**  
Ottawa, Nov. 28.—Rev. Dr. Her-  
ridge, of St. Andrew's Presbyterian  
Church yesterday morning, preached  
a sermon on temperance, in which he  
strongly opposed prohibition as a  
remedy for the evils of the liquor  
traffic.
