**WILL HAVE BIG CIRCUS**

New potatoes are now more plentiful and the price has dropped in answer to the increased supply from 18c to 20c to 15c to 18c per peck. Several fruits, cherries, red currants and the like, are fast disappearing, small quotations being offered this morning.

## TRYING TO RESCUE THEM

to know where certain streets led to, and eventually made some cautious inquiries as to the location of the county gaol. When they had received a desired information, they made off in the direction of Victoria Park, into which place they were seen going by some other parties.

On the same evening, a lady who lives alone in a house near Victoria Park, was startled about midnight on hearing someone moving about on her verandah. Looking out from behind a blind, she saw two men moving about in front of her place. She was so terrified that she could hardly move, but decided that her best plan would be to keep still and watch the manoeuvres of the strange pair. They did not make any attempt to get into the house, and after walking about for some time, as though examining the locality, they later disappeared in the darkness.

What these men were doing around the lady's house at such a late hour is a mystery. Others claim to have noticed the men prowling around in the vicinity of the gaol. Wherever they have been seen, they appear to have been examining the locality as though committing the surroundings to memory for some future purpose.

The next morning, on going out on her verandah, the lady in question picked up several pieces of paper which were blowing about. On examination she found them to be gum wrappers.

Yesterday afternoon Governor Davidson was asked if any strange men had called around to see the Giblitskies since they had been incarcerated in the county gaol.

"No," he replied. "No one has been allowed in to interview them, with the exception of their lawyers, and special precautions have been taken to prevent the prisoners having any chance to escape."

**PRISONERS SURLY.**

The three Giblitskies and Sam Kovinski have each been lodged in a separate cell, each of the cells being a cage apart, so that there is no chance for them to have any communication with one another. The authorities are of the belief that the Giblitskies are desperate enough to break gaol if the slightest opportunity were afforded them.

When they were first placed in the county cells, they all maintained a surly silence. They appeared greatly vexed at the treatment they had received, and persistently protested that they were not the principals in the far stealing affair.

The elder Giblitski has a hardened appearance, and views all that is passing about him with the stoicism and indifference of an Indian. He is shrewd and cunning, and very guarded in his speech. His two sons, Simon and Samuel, have widely differing characters. Simon, the elder of the two boys, appears to take everything philosophically, while Samuel has broken down and burst into tears several times since he was arrested. He says that he and his brother did not know they were running stolen furs. According to Samuel, they were both working in Detroit at the tanning business, when they received a message from their father to come to Chatham, "and of course as father sent for us we had to come," he concluded.
