SAM JONES' SECRET.

lecently Dead Evangelist a Few Year Ago Thus Described Events Which Led to His Career.

Which Led to His Career.

Sam Jones a few years ago himself described his life as follows:—

"I was born of religious parents, taught in the ways of virtue and manhood and escaped the evil that cursed so many human lives up to the beginning of the war between the States. My father joined the ranks of the Southern Confederacy. I joined the ranks of the devil. How I pity a boy at the age of fourteen years in times like those! I believe the war wrecked more young men than it killed old men. From the period of age between fourteen and twenty-four I learned the lesson that the way of the transgressor is hard. But, marvellous fact in human life, I have been from the age of twenty-four as honest and faithful a champion of manhood, truth and virtue, integrity, honor and right as I even missed the mark along that line in former years. It was not only revolution in my life but regeneration in my in former years. It was not only revolu-tion in my life but regeneration in my soul that transformed me from the practice of wrong to the championship

soul that transformed me have practice of wrong to the championship of the right.

"In 1872 I began my ministerial life as pastor of the old Van Wert circuit in Polk county, Ga. As I remember now I had only two books in my library. One was my Bible and other the fifth volume of Spurgeon's sermons. The volume of Spurgeon's sermons was invaluable to me. Many a time I had sat down and read its texts, and then began by saying if he got the juice out of his text in this way how will I get the juice out of my text? And the juice is all I ever wanted out of a text. Others may deal in bones and hoof and horn and that which is dry and tasteless, but I always wanted to give the juice to others. I never attended a

and tasteless, but I always wanted the juice, and always wanted to give the juice to others. I never attended a theological seminary. Till this blessed day I know nothing of systematic theology as a science. I never studied homiletica, or exegetics, or polemics. I never sought or taught oratory or rhe toric. I have always believed that there were three essentials to an effective speaker—first, clearness; second, concentration; third, directness. The average speaker cannot be clear unless he bathes the subject in a flood of light by illustration. Let an audience see what you are talking about. Second, concentration. Put a whole lead mine into one builet. Then, third, directness, aim where you want to hit and something will be lying around dead in that neck of woods.

"I have made the word of God the limit and boundary line of truth. I have considered myself free to think within that boundary line. I have never been hampered by rule or schools. God's word has been the circle and God himself the orbit around which my mind has moved. I have been called crank, mountebank, clown, fanatic and fool, and I have gathered all these titles up and am willing to wear them with hon or and cast them at my Saviour's feet at last as emblems of my convictions. Men have criticised me everywhere. If I had preached as the schools teach and systematic theology directs and logic and grammar demand, I would have been criticised as little as other

logic and grammar demand, I would have been criticised as little as other men, and moved in as small a circle as men, and moved in as small a circle as other men. A thousand times I have preferred mental training to mental culture. The preacher who reads and studies all the week and stands on the Sabbath day and vomits intellectually that which he has taken in during the week may please the fancy, but will never move the conscience of an audience. It is in the mental world as it never move the conscience of an audience. It is in the mental world as it is in the world of physics. A man who has studied forestry until he knows all the trees and all about trees, and writes fluently on their nature and quality, doesn't amount to much in the practical world. But the man who sees an axe handle in a tree and an axe in an ore bank, and has the genius to put the two together and thus furnish an implement that every farmer needs, he it is that the world applauds."

Mirrors.

The earliest looking glasses, or mirrors, were of either metal, highly pollshed, or of black painted mica. It is noted in Jewish history that the laver was made of brass "of the looking glasses of the women assembling, which assembled at the door of the tabernacle of the congregation," and some commentators conjecture that these women gave up their bronze or copper hand mirrors to supply the material for the laver. Egyptian women always carried their mirrors to the temples, and the Hebrew women probably did likewise, as do the Arabian and Turkish women to-day. Glass mirrors are of comparatively recent date. Mirrors of silver and gold were commonly used in mediaeval times. In 1360 Venice became the seat of the manufacture of glass mirrors, which have since superseded all other varieties, the improvements in the manufacture of plate glass enabling mirrors to be made of great size.
