The Perth Expositor tells some remarkable stories of the voracity of that inferior fish, the lyng, which does so much injury to game fish in Ontario waters. Some time ago, The Expositor says, Mr. Robert Moore was granted a license to net bull pout in Christie's Lake, and the other day he brought to The Expositor office one large lyng caught in the lake referred to, and it was dissected. This lyng had swallowed a pike which measured almost fourteen inches in length and also a full-sized sunfish. Mr. Ephraim Deacon, the fishery inspector at Bollingbrooke, called at Mr. Moore's to make an inspection, and he found the fisherman with quite a number of catrish, dozens of lyng, but no protected fish. Three lyng were dissected, with the following result: One contained three whitefish, eight inches long, and one bass; the second one had recently swallowed 39 pickerel minnows and three bass; and the last one opened was found to con ain a large number of partially decomposed pickerel minnows and ten recently swallowed. Northern Forests of the Dominion Cov er an Area About Forty-Four Times Greater Than England - Serious Dangers Which Threaten Timber-Suffer Dreadfully From Fire-Causes of Forest Fires - Forestry

The value of the forests of Canada is being realized more fully with the in-creasing price of lumber and forest products. It is therefore opportune that a Forestry Convention should have been called by the Premier of the Dom-

been estimated at between 700,000,000 recovery. This is the largest forest area possessed by any country in the world with the exception of Russia. It has been figured that the northern forests of Canada cover an area about forty-four times greater than England.

There are, however, serious dangers threatening this timber. The northern forests are mainly composed of coniferous trees, spruce predominating, and are therefore easily burned. Hardwood forests offer considerable resistance to sinous leaves and wood are a most inviting fuel. As has been stated, those who traveled our northern districts and have made close observation of the situation, make the statement that fire

the immense forests of those districts have suffered dreadfully from fire, and in many places the vegetable part of the soil has been so completely burned out that a couple of centuries must elapse before it is fully restocked. These fires are of annual occurrence and occasionally burn throughout the entire summer, destroying thousands of square miles of valuable timber to the south of the central watershed. It is authoritatively stated that at least one-half of the forest area of the interior of this part of Canada has been

totally destroyed by fire within the past twenty-five or thirty years.

The same is largely true of every part of the northern forest area of the Dominion, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Any one who has traveled

of splendid spruce forest, are now largely depleted and burned over.

The question arises whether anything can be done to prevent further destruction in these forests. The answer depends somewhat on the cause of the fires. Unquestionably fires occur through natural causes. It is sometimes surmised also that the friction of one tree against another may be sufficient to cause a fire, or that a globule fire rangers patrolling them will do much to help. But the public who may travel through these districts are care-less in handling fire, and if the Fores-
