

Death List Reaches a Thousand, and 10,000 In Fifty Leading Provincial Towns In Russia In the Last 24 Hours and Is Still Mounting-Guerrilla Warfare In the Caucasus-Terror In Odessa.

London, Nov. 4.—All reports received here go to confirm the continued seri-cusness of the situation throughout Russia, especially the anti-Jewish excesses. The Daily Mail's Odessa correspondent gives an unconfirmed report that Kishineff has been absolutely destroyed by fire, with its three suburbs, Persessyp, Zastava and Moldavanka. The Kleff correspondent of the same paper says that the British Consulate has been riddled with bullets. The British Consul was stopped by soldiers with levelled rifles. Russia, especially the anti-Jewish exsoldiers with levelled rifles.

Given Over to Murder,

Last evening the rioters pillaged the Last evening the rioters piliaged, the biggest drygoods store in the city. The loss in this case is estimated at \$175,000. A hardware store was looted, involving a loss of \$100,000. In addition twelve fur stores were sacked.

Ten Students Killed. Moscow, Nov. 4.—A procession of students, returning yesterday with some of their comrades who had been released from prison, was set upon by a mob of workmen at the Triumphal Arch. Ten of the students were killed. Relieved of His Post.

Petersburg, Nov. 4.—The Grand Duke, Alexander Michaelovitch, bro-ther-in-law of Emperor Nicholas, has been released of the post of head of the Department of Mercantile Marine. The Department of Mercantile Marine is to be merged with the new Ministry of Commerce, which probably accounts for the Grand Duke's retirement. Governor Flees

Kozloff, Russia, Nov. 4.—The Vice-Governor of Kozloff has fled from the city. The citizens are preserving or-der. Great manifestations occurred here Thursday, the crowds demanding the release of the political prisoners.

Fraternize With Soldiers. Warsaw, Nov. 4.—A remarkable fea-ture of the demonstrations here was the fraternizing of the people with the soldiers. The latter were carried about on the shoulders of the crowd and were furnished with champagne and cigar-ettes. All classes of the population participated in the demonstration. The participated in the demonstration. The greatest rage is felt against the Cos-sacks, in whose unprovoked attacks on the crowd before the City Hall many persons were killed or wounded. The authorities have released 350 political offenders, who were imprisoned in the citadel. A regiment of Dragoons has arrived here to reinforce the

Massacre Continues. Kleff, Russla, Nov. 4.—The refirement of Gen. Kleigels, the Governor-General of Kieff, who was removed Wednesday, and has been succeeded by Gen. Soukahomlinoff, has not serve ed to restore order. The whole city i ed to restore order. The whole city is in a ferment. A report that the Jews had destroyed a Christian monastery was circulated among the mob and served to provoke a renewal of the attacks on the Jews. The massacre continues. Gen. Karass, the military commander, called out the Cossacks, who were met with bombs, whereupon they fired into the crowd, killing twelve persons and wounding forty-four. persons and wounding forty-four.

All the stores and Jewish market have been plundered and destroyed.

Scene of Desolation, Rostoff-on-Don, Nov. 4.—This city presents a seem of desolation, but the rioters are exhausted by Thursday night's excesses and the rioting was not resumed yesterday. In the Jewish quarter only smoking ruins remain, In other sections stores are still burning. The Jews are seeking refuge where they can. The mob outrages continued all night. Shots were constantly heard.

DEATH OF GEN. PIPON.

Father of C. A. Pipon of Toronto Dies In Isle of Jersey.

Toronto, Nov. 4.—A cable message was received yesterday by C. A. Pipon of this city announcing the death at St. Heber's, Isle of Jersey, of his fa-ther, Gen. Philip Gosset Pipon, C. B., Col., commandant of the Royal Artif-

Gen. Pipon was born in 1824, was educated at the R. M. A., Woolwich, and entered the R. A. as second lieutenant in 1842. He saw no active service until the Crimean war of 1854-56, when he served throughout the whole campaign, being chief commissary of the siege of Sebastopol. For his ser-vices, he received the English medal with three clasps, the Turkish and Sar-dinian medals, and the fifth class of the Order of the Med#die. He came to Canada in the autumn of 1863 and commanded the R. A. in Montreal from that time until the spring of 1888. Dur-ing that period occurred here the Fen-ian troubles of 1886, when Gen. Plpon was again in the field. For that service the deceased received the Canadian General Service medal. Besides those services enumerated, Gen. Pipon served in Ceylon and Indian, being created C. B. in 1875.

DR. MAY'S SUSPENSION. Charge Is That He Accepted Fees From Publishers.

Toronto, Nov. 4.—Accepting tolls for the promotion of the sales of certain books to the town libraries of Ontario is the charge which Dr. S. P. May, inspector of public libraries, is under suspension for by the Ontario Government. The suspension is only temporary, prior to a trial of the case by Hon. Dr. Pyne, the Minister of Education, which will be held shortly. The amount involved in the case is considerable, some stating that it reaches over \$10,000. The salary connected with the position which he occupied for thirty years is \$1,700 per annum. He has acted in several other capacities for Canada at different expositions, among them the World's Fair at Chicago in 1893. While he was acting as secretary for the Dominion

acting as secretary for the Dominion of Canada at the Paris Exposition in 1878 he was decorated with the order of the Legion of Honor and that of the Palm Leaves, constituting him an officer of the French Academy. The charges made are the outcome of an investigation made by T. W. H.

Leavitt, who is mentioned as the likely successor. Mr. Leavitt refused to state the result of his efforts, but in reply to a question acknowledged that \$700 a year for a number of years past would be a fair estimate of the amount secured by Dr. May through his connection with the publishing

The Government of Ontario, in re The Government of Ontario, in return for the Provincial grant to the library boards of towns, has the right to direct to a certain degree what books will be purchased by the boards. The lists of these book were sent out by Dr. May as the inspector of public libraries, It is stated that the lists sent out contained the names of books which should not have been there and that Dr. May was given money for placing them on the list. The Government, however, could not direct the boards to purchase them at any particular publishing house. Yet the benefit to a publishing house. Yet the benefit to a publishing house which had the sole agency for a certain book was obvious. This was recognized and the inspector approached on different occasions to place books on the list to the profit of the publishing house. In return for this he received different sums, according to the sale urn for the Provincial grant to the different sums, according to the sale the book was likely to receive.

THE LLOYD CASE.

It Is Not British Justice to Deny Pris-

Belleville, Nov. 4.—The grand jury at the present Assizes, before whom the Crown Prosecutor refused to lay the Lloyd mirder case, made the follow-ing reference to the matter when they brought and their presentment yester-

day:
"We were instructed by your lord-ship that the Crown would bring be-fore us for consideration an indictment against one Adam Lloyd charged with the murder of his wife. No such bill has been offered before us, atthough we found the prisoner in jail ready for his /tjal, and from your lordship's charge to us we inferred that the Crown was ready to proceed. We can crown was ready to proceed. We cannot, therefore, understand why the case was not presented to us, and it does not appear to us to be in accordance with British principles of fairness that the prisoner should be denied his trial and kept in jall, whether gulky or not, and that the public interests should be left unsatisfied in such an important matter. We do not know where the matter. We do not know where the blame lies, but we feel it our dufy to bring the matter to the attention of the court."

Chief Justice Meredith made no reference to the grand jury's remarks about the Lloyd case.
