Prophet's Words Recalled By Oats.

FAMOUS BRENNCH PROPHECY SAID OATS WOULD DETERMINE WINNER OF THE WAR. It is said that before the big war started a famous prophet of France had forecast the event, and said that on the blades of oats in the field would be found the letter 'W' to verify his prophecy. There are those in the city who read of his prediction and, on examining the oat plants found the 'W' on the blades as predicted. The prophet is further alleged to have predicted that prior to the final of the great war the oat fields would predict the winner. If the victors were to fall to the Germans a 'G' would appear on the oates; if to the British the letter 'B' would be found on the oat blades. Those who took cognizance of the prophet's words and, earlier in the proceedings, found the 'W' signifying war, on the blades of oats, have been following the oat fields since, looking for the letter that, according to prophecy, was to fortel the victory. Y. M. C. A. Activities.

As a result of Y. M. C. A. service or internment men in allied countries, including Canada, a marked change is beginning to be seen in the attitude of the German military authorities towards captive prisoners of war in that Empire. In this report, Mr. Paul Arni Swiss Secretary, working for French and British in Germany, says: "The first permit granted me only gave me a right to the distribution of gifts among the War-prisoners. My activity in camps was thereby very limited. Then I received reports from our Secretaries working in Russian war prisoners' camps in Siberia and pictures from war prisoners camps in England, and presented them to the War Ministry for inspection. At New Years I was able to receive as guest the Chief of a section of the War Ministry; we had a long conversation in which I gave him a description of a manifold activity among prisoners of all nations. A list gradually created at the War Ministry an atmosphere of confidence and kind disposition towards us, and this spring at a special session of the War Ministry a new permit was granted me for my camp visits and a special manager was dispatched to me, to let me know the good result of my transaction. This new permit reads as follows: "You are authorized not only to look after the welfare of the War-prisoners, and to speak to them, to take note of their desires for gifts and have photos taken of them, but also to have the following privileges: the installing of halls for divine services, of opening schools, reading rooms, the arranging of grounds for sports, gymnastics and open air games, the organizing of work-shops, and libraries. To this end you are authorized to be a heater at these divine services held in the camp, at the instruction in school and at the theatrical representations. You are also authorized to send gifts to the prisoners, to transmit money and to advance money. Local officials are requested to give you the necessary protection and assistance." Sheep Pay Best of all Live Stock in Nova Scotia

High Prices for Wool and Mutton are assured for some years After the War Now is The Time to Increase Nova Scotia Flocks, Keep Your Ewe Lambs

If you have more than you need give your neighbours to purchase them for breeding purposes. Do not sell them to the butcher unless you cannot help it.

1918 legislation requires the compulsory taxation of every ewe in Nova Scotia and provides for paying compensation to owners of sheep destroyed by dogs. Owners of which are known. Now let every farmer who can, help meet war demands by keeping sheep.

The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with the Live Stock Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, announce the following points:

- 1.—Several hundred selected grade ewe lambs have been purchased and will be sold at cost to bona fide sheep breeders wishing to secure them.
2.—The Department will pay transportation on these ewe-lambs from place of purchase to destination.
3.—If parties wishing to secure ewe lambs for breeding purposes will write the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, Truro, they will get advice relative to price and other particulars. If all lambs already secured are disposed of, an effort will be made to purchase more. Get orders in early, as later prices may be higher.
4.—The Live Stock Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture will assist as heretofore the distribution of pure bred rams.
5.—To supplement the distribution of pure bred rams, the Provincial Department of Agriculture will secure and ship at cost, high class unregistered rams in lots at slightly higher than butcher prices.
6.—Mr. S. A. Logan in charge of Sheep Extension Work of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture will, as far as possible, call on parties wishing help with their sheep flocks or requiring further information in regard to the increasing of their flocks.
