## SCHOOL-TEACHERS

(Continued from page 1)

1. This schedule shall be retroactive to September 1st, 1920.  
The placing of the teachers on this schedule shall be determined by the full length of service on the Brandon staff.

2. New teachers coming on the staff shall receive credit for one-half of their outside experience up to ten years, the first two years not to be counted.

3. In the elementary schools an additional \$50 shall be given to those teachers holding certificates for first class.

In the elementary schools an additional \$100 shall be given to those teachers holding a B.A. degree.

**A—Elementary Teachers Other than Principals—**

Grades One, Two, Three and Four—Minimum \$1200, maximum \$1800.

Grades One Jr. and Five—Minimum \$1225, maximum \$1825.

Grade Six—Maximum \$2250, minimum \$1850.

Grade Seven—Minimum \$1275, minimum \$1875.

Grade Eight—Minimum \$1300, maximum \$1900.

A yearly increment of \$50; a twelve years' schedule.

B—Collegiate assistants' schedule—Male assistants—Minimum \$2200, maximum \$3200.

Female assistants—Minimum \$1800, maximum \$2800.

C—Principal's schedule—

1. Schools from ten to fifteen rooms—Male principals, minimum \$2200; maximum \$3200. Female principals, minimum \$1800, maximum \$2800.

2. Schools of less than ten rooms—The minimum grade salary for the grade taught, plus \$50 for each room in the school, e.g., a five room school, minimum \$1450, maximum \$2450.

This is a ten year's schedule with an annual increment of \$100.

D—Special Departments—

1. Household Science—Supervisor, minimum \$1800, maximum \$2800; assistant, minimum \$1600, maximum \$2600.

2. Manual Training—Supervisor, minimum \$2100, maximum \$3100; assistant, minimum \$1700, maximum \$2700.

3. Art Supervisor—Minimum \$2,000, maximum \$3,000.

4. Physical Director—Minimum \$1900, maximum \$2900.

Re Special Departments—A ten-year schedule with a yearly increment of \$100.
