## ACTING PREMIER CLARKE'S APPEAL

Fredericton, Oct. 10, 1914  
To the People of New Brunswick:  
The disaster which has followed the Belgian people since the opening of the war shows no prospect of abatement, and they are in great distress.

From many parts of the empire assistance has been given to meet the necessities of the situation and to mitigate the suffering which has been forced upon a nation which, desiring peace, was compelled to take up arms for the preservation of its national integrity. The contributions so far made are not sufficient to meet the pressing needs, if suffering and death are to be prevented. Under the circumstances it has been deemed proper to issue a direct appeal to you and I am satisfied it will meet with a universal response.

It is needless for me to say that the Belgians are deserving at our hands of every assistance we can render. In defending their own homes they are fighting our battle for the preservation of the liberties which we so fully enjoy. Their heroism and the sacrifices made by them in defence of their freedom and their families and for the maintenance of liberty and international good faith have challenged the admiration of the world, while the delay secured by their magnificent resistance to the German invaders has proved of invaluable service to the empire and its allies.

Because of their heroic stand the lands of the Belgians have been laid waste, their towns and cities have been sacked, their homes have been violated and wrecked, their industries ruined and they have been brought face to face with starvation and complete destitution. Already in many portions of the province the work of providing relief has been begun. It is important that it should be generally undertaken, for there are few homes within our borders which cannot contribute something in the way of food or clothing.

With the approval of the government I am taking the liberty to ask that committees be appointed in every city, town, municipality and parish in the province, that these committees solicit gifts of clothing and food; that aid be given to the extent and ability of each individual, and that the contributions be neatly and securely packed and forwarded as directed in the memorandum given below.

**MEMORANDUM**

- (1) Committees should be appointed in every city, town, and municipality in the province to collect at once all such food and clothing as are available.
- (2) Free transportation will be furnished by the Canadian Pacific and Intercolonial railways, and instructions for shipment may be obtained from any local agent.
- (3) Goods will be received and handled carefully and stored in a frost-proof warehouse in St. John, free of charge.
- (4) The government will provide a ship or shipping accommodation to carry the goods from St. John to a point where they can be most conveniently distributed on the other side of the Atlantic, and announcement of the date of sailing will be made at the earliest possible moment.
- (5) In order to have everything systematically arranged the goods should be packed in classes approximately as in the list below, so that there will be no difficulty in re-arranging and re-packing. Potatoes and vegetables must be packed for final shipment in barrels. If local committees are unable to undertake this, these articles should be sent to some concentration point where they can be re-packed into barrels. Only full matured vegetables and keeping varieties of apples should be sent. Any produce arriving not suitable for shipment will be disposed of, and proceeds used for the benefit of the Belgian fund.
- (6) All material collected should be carefully packed and shipped, plainly addressed to "Belgian Relief Committee, St. John, N. B."
- (7) Reports should be made from time to time to the Hon. D. V. Landry, provincial secretary-treasurer, at Fredericton.

### Distribution of Seed Grain and Potatoes from the Dominion Experimental Farms 1914-1915

By instructions of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the coming winter and spring to Canadian farmers.

The samples for general distribution will consist of spring wheat (about 5 lbs.), white oats (about 4 lbs.), barley (about 5 lbs.), and field peas (about 5 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free, by mail.

farms, and some account of their experience with such kinds of grain (or potatoes) as they have grown, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be selected.

Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample of grain and one of potatoes can be sent to each farm. If both samples are asked for in the same letter only one will be sent. Applications on any kind of printed form cannot be accepted.

As the supply of seed is limited, farmers are advised to apply early; but the applications will not necessarily be filled in the exact order in which they are received. Preference will always be given to the most thoughtful and explicit requests. Applications received after the end of January will probably be too late.

All applications for grain (and applications from the provinces of Ontario and Quebec for potatoes) should be addressed to the Dominion Cerealists, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Such applications require no postage. If otherwise addressed delay and disappointment may occur.
