HOME GUARDS ARE THE REAL THING

Civilian Troops of London Who
Could Take Their Place
With Regulars.

London, Nov. 23.—The Home Guards, composed of brokers, clerks, agents and other men exempt from active service working in London financial district, showed themselves a well trained and physically fit body of troops at a recent inspection. When the civilian troops received permission from the War Office to organize, they encountered ridicule in many quarters. But they bought their uniforms and went to work with will. Every afternoon squads drilled in the courts and buildings and in the public parks, and on Saturday afternoons and Sundays the men either went to the country to practice trench digging or hardened themselves with marching. Volunteer corps have sprung up all over the country and could face a hard campaign as well or better than the regular troops in conventionalist countries. Its members are generally over forty years of age.

TEUTONS TRY TO STRENGTHEN LINES

Have Been Laboring Hard to
Fortify Themselves Against
Russians in Volhynia.

Petrograd (via London), Nov. 23.—Koslov, head of the Kiev River region, in Volhynia, where the Russians have recently reported successes over their Teutonic adversaries, is being prepared for the possibility of an advance of the battle line westward, according to refugees. The German administration is declared to have put enforced labor into effect during the past month, pressing the work of constructing strong fortifications, which have been completed by the use of cement quarries in the vicinity. Military stores have been removed and the able-bodied population has left the city in expectation of heavy fighting. The refugees state a food shortage in the city is reported.

WAGE MOSQUITO WAR.

Walter B. Denegre says Massachusetts North Shore Residents Plan to Raise \$40,000 for the Work.

Manchester, Mass., Nov. 23.—Earl M. Harvey, a Boston & Maine civil engineer, lectured this evening at the Town Hall under the auspices of the Parent-Teachers' Association and the North Shore Association on the extermination of the mosquito.

Walter B. Denegre, president of the recently incorporated North Shore Association, discussed at length the desirability and practicability of relieving the North Shore of the pest. He said \$1,300 was spent last summer in preliminary work, and the plan is to raise \$20,000 from association members, who will be asked to contribute \$50 each for three years. It is hoped \$10,000 can be raised for continuance of the work from the towns and people benefited.

The methods employed will be draining stagnant pools, stocking ponds with fish to devour the larvae and ditching salt marshes in the territory stretching from Danvers to Magnolia and reaching two miles from the sea.

WITHDRAW SOME OF ADMISSIONS

Defence Take Back Admission
of Captain Boy-ed's Con-
nection with Conspiracy

New York, Nov. 23.—The jury box in the case against the men charged with conspiracy to defraud U. S. customs, was filled within an hour after today's session opened and the jurors were accepted by both sides and then sworn. Immediately after this, William Randolph, counsel for the defense, notified the court that part of the previous admission pertaining to the alleged connection of Captain R. Boy-ed, German naval attaché, with the acts charged by the Government. This part of the admission made by the defendants stated that Captain Boy-ed had been consulted regarding the sending of steamships with supplies to German sea raiders, and that the work had been carried on largely under the naval attaché's direction. No reason for withdrawing the admission was given. It became known today that an important witness for the Government had left the jurisdiction of the United States a week ago, and is at present in Liverpool. The name of the witness and what case he was in the Government's machinery in the case were not disclosed by the prosecution.

DEFENDS STAFF IN FRANCE.

Criticisms Unjustifiable, Says Bishop of London.

London, Nov. 23.—The Bishop of London, in a speech yesterday, referred to the criticisms directed against the British Headquarters Staff in France. He said: "I had the great honor and pleasure of being myself a guest at Headquarters for eight days before I went to the battle, and I can only say that it is not a fragment of truth of any kind in the reports. I came upon a body of distinguished British soldiers, up to the mark in the morning and working late at night with one idea in their minds, and that is to finish the war victoriously for our country."

"During the whole time I was there I never saw one lady except a poor little French woman, who brought me a most inadequate bath, which almost destroyed the sympathy between Allied countries because I splashed over the room water to the annoyance of the French woman."

YUKON BOYS' PARADISE.

Hunting Huns Now Instead of "Old Grizzly."

London, Nov. 23.—Sergeant Christie, a well-known hunter in the Yukon Territory, writes to a friend at Shorncliffe as follows: "I wish I had yours if and about four more old hunters from the Yukon. We could make a name for ourselves and do good business with the Huns, as I am now in charge of our battery's snipers. The job suits me O. K., but most of the boys get tired of it after a while. Old Grizzly has up to now proved a more formidable enemy than the Huns."

TOD SLOAN DEPORTED.

London, Nov. 23.—Tod Sloan, the former jockey, was arrested here today on a deportation order from the Home Secretary, under the Defence of the Realm Act. He will be sent back to the United States immediately.
