BYE-LAWS.

At a meeting of the County Council of the Municipality of Northumberland, held at the Council Chamber, Newcastle, on Tuesday, the nineteenth day of January, Resolved, That the following Bye-Laws be made and established for the government of the Municipality :-

A Bye-Law for the PREVENTION OF VICE AND IMMORALITY.

Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland.

1. That no person shall expose any Stallion on the service of any Mare in the view of the public, in any highway, street, lane or public square, nor within any field or common within the distance of one fundred yards of any such street, lane, or public square whatso-ever, in the County of Northumberland, under a penalty of Ten Dollars for each such offence. A Bye-Law relating to

DOG TAX. Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County

of Northumberland. 1. That outside of the limits of any incorporated Town in this County of Northumberland, any ratepayer or householder in any parish of the County, being owner of a dog or dogs, shall be exempt from taxation of one male dog, as provided by an Act of the Legislature, entituled "An Act to impose a tax on dogs, for the protec-


CATTLE GOING AT LARGE. Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County

of Northumberland. 1. That section 10 of Bye-Law No. 6, passed at July Sittings, 1885, be repealed, and in lieu thereof: That no cow or neat cattle, sheep, lamb, or hog, be allowed or suffered to go at large or graze or feed on the road or highway in that part of the Parish of Nelson lying be-tween the lower line of said Parish and Foley's Cove, so called; such district shall extend to the rear of the Nowlan Settlement.

A Bye-Law relating to the REMUNERATION OF COUNTY COUNCILLORS. Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland.

1. That from the beginning of the present session of this Council, each Councillor shall receive the sum of Three Dollars per day for each day of said Session, in addition to mileage, as allowed by law.

2. That any Councillor who shall be absent from duty any full day without permission of the Council, shall not be entitled to receive said sum of \$3 for such day or days during which he may be absent.
