PROTECTION OF SCHOOLS. Montreal Society to Petition for Law

Requiring Fire Escapes.

Requiring Fire Escapes.

Montreal, March 11.—The Society for the Protection of Women and Children this morning took up the fight for better protection of the schools of Montreal against fire and adopted resolutions providing for petitioning the Provincial Legislature for the passage of laws compelling the authorities to properly equip all school buildings with outside fire escapes.

These fire escapes, it is proposed, shall consist of outside iron galleries on every floor above the first, running completely around the building, wherever possible, and that such galleries have one or more staircases from one to the other on each side of the building. The width of the galleries, slope and width of staircases and height of steps to be regulated by act.

A bill is to be introduced at the present session of the Legislature embodying these recommendations.
