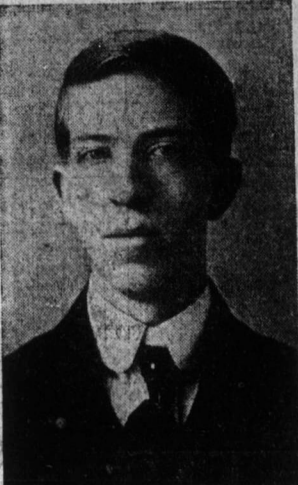

SAW HE THE BURGLAR?

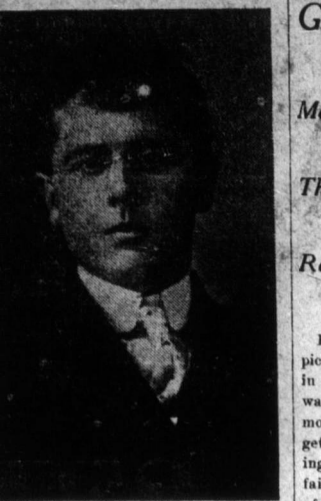
