Funeral of the Late Rev. Dr. Carr

CLERGYMAN DEAD

Rev. Dr. Carr, the well-beloved Presbyterian pastor of Campbellton, who was recently nominated by a Western Presbytery for the Moderatorship of the General Assembly, died at his home in Campbellton on the 15th instant. His long and useful career as pastor of St. Andrew's church made him beloved not only by his own congregation, but by all classes of citizens in Campbellton. A few weeks ago Rev. Dr. Carr was taken ill and was obliged to take his bed. For a time it was not thought that his condition was serious, but later he failed rapidly and on the 14th took a sudden turn, and expired next morning of cancer of the stomach. The deceased was 66 years of age, and is survived by a wife, four sons and two daughters.

Campbellton Feb. 18—

The funeral of the late lamented Rev. A. F. Carr, M. A., D. D., was held here this afternoon in the private service at the house was held at 1:30 p. m. The funeral arrangements were made under the direction of the Presbytery of Miramichi. The public services were held in St. Andrew's church, and it needless for us to add, was very largely attended, citizens of all denominations being in attendance. At 2:15 the funeral cortege entered the church, and the hier containing the body of the beloved pastor of St. Andrew's, was placed before the altar.

The services were opened by the singing of hymn 474 "Lord Thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations," by the choir of St. Andrew's.

Rev. Mr. Simpson of Douglastown, N. B., read the Scripture lesson.

Prayer—Rev. Mr. McLean of Chatham.

Hymn 346—"Thine eyes shall see the King in His beauty."

Rev. Mr. McLeod, of New Mills, Clerk of the Presbytery of Miramichi, spoke as follows on the life and work of the deceased:

We are gathered together today under the shadow of a great bereavement, to pay our tribute of respect to the beloved pastor of this church, a respected citizen of this town for over twenty years and the sincere friend of all of us.

The Rev. Arthur Frederic Carr, M. A., D. D., was born about 66 years ago near Summerside, P. E. Island, of godly parents, of him the saying of Wordsworth was true, "Heaven lies about us in our infancy."

He passed from the public school into Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, where he laid the foundation of a good education. He studied also under the venerable and saintly Dr. Patterson of Bedouque, P. E. I., for whom he had profound respect. He took his arts course in Dalhousie College, Halifax, and graduated as M. A. with distinction. He received his theological training in the Protestant Episcopal Seminary, and in that institution he laid the foundation of his life as a minister of the Gospel.

It was in 1877 that he finished his theological course, and on Oct. 4th of that year (1877) he was ordained to the Holy Ministry, and inducted into the pastoral charge of the congregation of St. Andrew's, P. E. Island.

For 18 years he ministered faithfully to that important congregation, and under him it developed into three congregations. No pastor could be more loved by his people than Mr. Carr was by his congregation. It was with the deepest regret that parted with him. It is a singular coincidence that one of his former parishes, St. Andrew's, should be in the Moderator's charge on this solemn occasion. While Mr. McArthur also listened to his ministrations during that period.

In the year 1883 St. Andrew's Church, Campbellton, extended a hearty call to the pastor of Alberton, which he accepted to the great delight of the congregation and the Presbytery of Miramichi, and on Oct. 1, 1889, he was inducted to the pastoral charge of this congregation. Of the six ministers who were present on that occasion, three have passed away and three are in other Provinces.

Of Dr. Carr's works of faith and love for over 29 years in this congregation of the highlands that he set before the citizens of this town, a his own inspiring example, I need not remind you.

A tablet in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, to the memory of Sir Charles Wren, architect of the church bears the inscription: "If you seek his monument look around." And so we wish to see Dr. Carr's monument, we may look around, not only in this congregation, but in the adjoining congregations, St. Paul's, St. John's, St. Peter's, St. James' and St. George's.

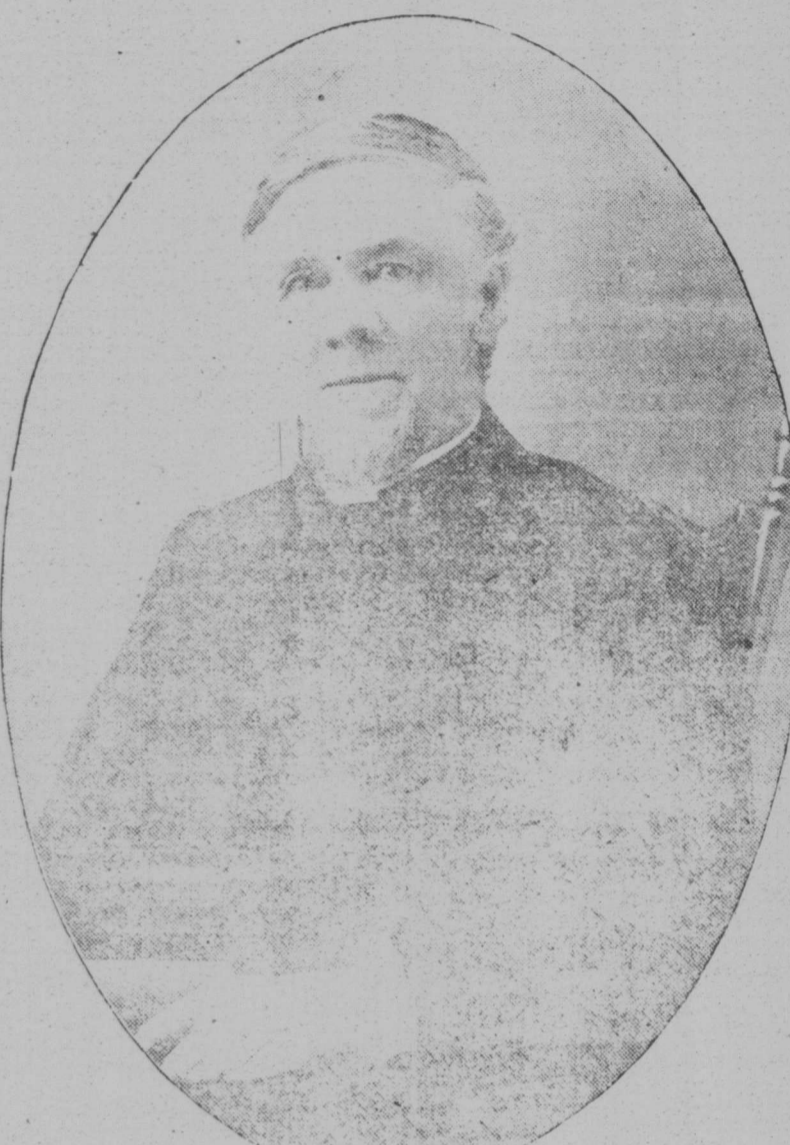
