**Routine Business—Reports—Encourage-
ment to Manufacturers.**
Friday, 3rd, 1882.

The regular meeting of the Town
Council was held this evening.
There were present, his Worship in
the chair, Messrs Johnston, Campbell,
Hutchison, Bingham, Butler, Cameron,
Dancy, Edward, Humber, Nicholson
and Swanson.

The minutes of last meeting were
read and approved.
THE TREASURER'S REPORT.
[The Treasurer's report, which was received
since last meeting, \$1,916.42 had been
paid out, and a balance of \$411.33 re-
mained in the bank. Referred to Finance
committee.]

THE STREET INSPECTOR'S REPORT,
recommending certain repairs and im-
provements, was referred to the Public
Works committee.

THE SEXTON'S REPORT
showed the number of interments since
last report to be 7, viz: adults, 2; child-
ren, 5.

A number of accounts were presented
and referred to Finance committee.
Mr. Johnston gave notice that at next
meeting he would move the adoption of
the following resolution: That this Coun-
cil do provide a person to act as day
constable and street inspector, his duties
to be defined by by-law of this Council.

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT.
The Finance committee recommended
the payment of the following accounts:
E. Belcher, relief, 4.50; Star, printing,
50c; News, printing, 25c; Mrs. Mit-
chell, relief, \$3.25; Wm. Mitchell, re-
lief, \$17.27; The Signal, printing, \$2.
50; E. Graham, fire dept., \$1.37; E.
Graham, 82c.

On motion of Dancy, seconded by
Johnston, the report was adopted.
It having been stated that the village
of Blyth was intending to purchase a
hand fire engine.

It was moved by Campbell, seconded
by Swanson, that the clerk be instructed
to communicate with the authorities
of Blyth in reference to the sale of a
hand fire engine. Carried.

The Reseve read a communication from
Messrs. Scott & Bell, of Wingham.

Moved by Cameron, seconded by Ed-
ward, that the Clerk be instructed to
communicate with Messrs Scott & Bell
to say that this Council will consider
with the greatest possible favor any ad-
vances made by Messrs Scott & Bell to
start a furniture manufactory, here, and
will grant any reasonable bonus to them,
and trusts that they will at the earliest
possible moment come to Goderich and
meet with the special committee appoint-
ed by the Council, when the matter as
to the bonus and other details may be
arranged, and a by-law granting a bonus
may be submitted to the people as soon
as possible. Carried.

The matter of relief to Winter's child-
ren was referred to Relief committee.

Mr. Garrow's opinion on the new
market law was read and referred to the
Finance committee; and the Market
committee was authorized to make ar-
rangements until such time as a by-law
can be passed.

The question of increased railway ac-
commodation was brought up by Camer-
on, but nothing definite was arrived at.

Moved by Cameron, seconded by
Bingham, that the Public Works com-
mittee be requested to consider the ap-
plication of Mr. Aldworth for a drain.
Carried.

By-law No. 6, of 1882, to exempt cer-
tain buildings from taxation, was read a
first and second time, and a rule being
suspended, a third time, and passed.

The Council then adjourned.

Regular meeting last Monday night.

Legislators and salt bags.

On the item of 25 per cent. duty on
salt bags Mr. Anglin objected to the
clause as a tax on the farmers.

Mr. Farrow claimed that the salt-
making industry was languishing, and
\$500,000 worth of capital besides, and it
was only fair to give this "small" en-
couragement to this industry.

Mr. Blake asked what was the idea of
the duty; and what would be its effect?

Sir Leonard Tilly said it was intend-
ed as a protection to the salt manufac-
turers.

Mr. Blake wanted to know what would
be the effect in relation to the price of the
article, but a long discussion followed,
in which Sir Leonard Tilly, Mr. Mac-
kenzie Bowell, Mr. Hesse and Mr.
Farrow took part, resulting in state-
ments being made that the cloth of which
these bags were made was charged duty,
and that bags made up and
