The British Elections and the Government Dispatch.

Last Monday the British Parliament was dissolved. The interval between dissolution and the return of the first batch of members was short. Yesterday fifteen candidates were returned unopposed, eleven to support Balfour and four Asquith. These returns show that these were safe party seats, and that the weaker party declined to waste money and energy on forlorn hopes. The first polling takes place to-day when 70 seats will be filled. Last January they returned 44 supporters of the Government, 36 being Liberals and 8 Labour men, and 26 opponents of the Government. In this batch Asquith had a majority of 18. The value of to-day's results will be in the indication it will give as to the trend of the mind of the Electorate. Will the majority of 16 on this batch be increased, decreased, or will it remain the same?

The cable news, available to-day shows how large looms the question of the Referendum and Home Rule in the present campaign. To our intense disgust the Government despatch is worse than ever to-day. There is an interesting item from Boston, sent by American and Canadian sympathisers to the Irish party, which falls off with an item which we read some time ago in an outside newspaper. The despatch from London is the "limit" in drivel. It is little else than a mass of ignorance, mendacity and stupidity. It is up to the Hon. R. Watson to see that the "improved" Government news despatch does not "pau" worse than the former one, and that was often bad enough, as our frequent complaints indicate. But the part under reference is the worst in our experience. It is tantamount to the breakdown should occur just on the eve of the British Election, and that the Hon. R. Watson had informed us that he had arranged for better things. We hope the honourable gentleman will insist on getting what he arranged for. We shall not be backward in backing him up with complaints about such drivel as we received to-day.

Committed for Trial.

A preliminary examination was held before Judge Conroy at the Court House this forenoon in the charge of bugany preferred against Herbert H. Thoms of H. M. S. Brilliant exclusively reported in the Telegram. The evidence of Alma Barbara Victoria Gush, was taken with that of Supt. Grimes and Rev. Hy. Uphill who performed the marriage ceremony, after which the accused was committed for trial in the Supreme Court.

William Dunlop who shot Dr. Pritchard at Bay Roberts, was before Judge Oke at Harbor Oke yesterday at 5 p.m., and was also committed for trial before the Supreme Court. He was brought here by to-day's train in the custody of Sergt. Sheppard and Constable Dooley and taken to the Penitentiary. He is a fine athletic looking man and seemed to feel keenly the unfortunate position he is placed in.

Hamlet Still Missing.

Up to noon to-day no word had been received of the arrival of the Danish schooner Hamlet at Lunenburg, though she left this port over two weeks ago to-day. Just before one o'clock to-day a western craft arrived in port with a boat in tow, containing a man, a ship's lifeboat. It was painted white as were the boats of the Hamlet and there was much conjecture along the waterfront about the particular boat, many believing that it was one of the Hamlet's boats which have been picked up.

Fishing in Trinity Bay.

The fishermen in Trinity Bay, North Side, have done remarkably well with the fish all November. At Smith's Sound some men have as high as 100 qts. since October for a boat of 2 men. At Britannia Cove, one man who came home from Labrador with only six quintals of fish in October, now has nearly 100 qts. for his hand. There are several crews of three men who have 200 qts. They are selling the fish from salt bulk.
