The Municipal Bill in the Assembly.

Last night, the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, in the House of Assembly, moved the second reading of the Municipal Bill. He did so for a purely formal purpose of referring it to a Joint Select Committee of the two Houses. In moving the second reading, the Premier reserved all questions of principle involved in the bill, more or less intimating that he had no desire to commit himself at the present stage to any one of the many principles involved in the provisions of the bill. Sir Edward said there were a number of sections which would probably be objected to by the owners of Mr. George Neal, representing the Bell Island S. S. Company. Several attempts to refoat her proved futile until last week when Mr. Colbourne and other assistants from Bell Island, with the aid of divers, pumps, etc., successfully accomplished the task of raising the submerged steamer. The Otter is in a badly battered condition as a result of laying on the bottom so long. She will be dry docked and reclassified and put in first class condition for the mail service again.

The Bell Island mail steamer Mary towed to port last night the little steamer Otter, which was successfully refloated. It will be remembered that the Otter, which used to ply between Bell Island, Portugal Cove, Kelligrews and other Conception Bay points, ran ashore near Cupids, during a storm last October. The vessel became totally submerged and was subsequently sold by the owners to Mr. George Neal, representing the Bell Island S. S. Company. Several attempts to refoat her proved futile until last week when Mr. Colbourne and other assistants from Bell Island, with the aid of divers, pumps, etc., successfully accomplished the task of raising the submerged steamer. The Otter is in a badly battered condition as a result of laying on the bottom so long. She will be dry docked and reclassified and put in first class condition for the mail service again.

S. S. Terra Nova Landed Heavy Cargo

The s.s. Terra Nova, Capt. S. R. Winsor, finished landing her cargo of seals last evening. Her turnout is as follows: 25,535 seal pups, 246 young hoods, 213 old hoods, 745 bedlamers, 114 old hoods; total, 26,533. Gross value \$77,756.67; net value \$77,756.67; gross weight 676 tons, 2 cwt., 3 qrs., 3 lbs. The crew of 202 men shared \$127.38 each. Capt. Winsor's share is \$3,110.25. The average weight of the young hoods was 54 lbs., and of the young hoods 46 lbs.

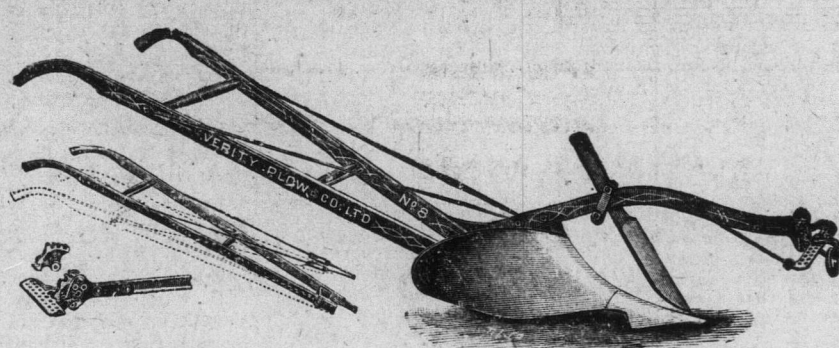
