GOOD ROADS.

Good roads are something which everybody wants for nothing. As there is nothing free in this country except elbow-room and the grip, the good roads movement is having hard work breaking any of the speed records.

The good roads agitation always shows a more rapid pulse in the winter time, and converts a great number of people who object to travelling over highways that look like an Alpine mountain range. But man has a short and brittle memory, and when summer comes and the roads lie down flat again public enthusiasm also lies down and buttons the flap on its coin pocket. There are more good roads enthusiasts during the rainy season than at any other time of the year, and if a vote on a bond issue could be taken immediately after a three-day cloudburst, the polls would be more congested than the table at a 15-cent supper.

The present method of making good roads is to plow them down the centre with a sixteen-inch cultivator and decorate the road-bed with sod. This provides a smooth, resilient surface which can be travelled in perfect safety by the still-walking crane or an automobile which cuts through the fields. It is not at all difficult to convert the owner of a new automobile to the good roads theory if he is trying to worm his way through a fresh sod improvement, two miles and a half long and running from fence to fence.

This life is full of strange inconsistencies. People complain about the money wasted on chewing gum, false hair and skin foods, but it isn't the price of a hair-cut, to the sums wasted in patching roads that refuse to stay patched. The automobile is the evangelist of the good roads movement. Every sale of a five passenger touring car with tires subject to sudden and disheartening puncture means better roads and more of them. Therefore, we should all buy touring cars and cease to knock the good roads advocates.

Good roads are more conducive to human happiness than good digestion. You can coddle your digestion with milked milk, but there is nothing that will convert a cow path into a hard-

surfaced highway except brains plus money.

### Fiber Containers

AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR GLASS AND TIN.

The use of fiber containers in marketing various food products has greatly increased because of the shortage of tin plate. The principal question raised concerns the kinds of products that can be successfully marketed in such containers. The Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce has been advised by a manufacturer that the following-named articles have been successfully handled by the users of its fiber containers: Sirups that do not ferment; jellies, jams, marmalades; honey; salted nuts, marshmallow products known under trade names such as marshmallow whip, mallow topping, and the like (these products to be used for soda-fountain trade, household use, etc.); marshmallows; hard candies; chocolate-coated confections; sugar butter (spread for bread); malted milk; glace fruit; shoe whitening; cocoa; and almost every one of the most commonly used spices.

The following products may be packed in fiber containers for a short length of time: Cottage cheese and other soft curd cheeses, lard, pickled fish, sausage meat, horseradish, sauerkraut, ice cream, and various delicatessen products and soda-fountain supplies.

Another use for the fiber containers is as measures for dried products, such as crackers, small cakes, salted peanuts, salted and dry-cured fish of many varieties and most kinds of sweets and candies.

One concern has reported that it has an order for fiber containers to be used for holding a liquid chemical fire extinguisher.--Scientific American.

## EARLY ME

LONDON AGAIN RAIDED; 47 KILLED AND 169 INJURED.

LONDON, Jan. 29. About fifteen German airplanes, of which four or five reached London, took part in the first of the two raids last night, it is announced officially. Only one of the raiders engaged in the second attack penetrated as far as the city.

The latest information from the raid shows that two groups of raiders crossed the Essex coast and one group the Kent coast practically simultaneously at about 8 p.m. The two former detachments proceeded towards London on parallel courses across Essex. The capital was approached from the east and northeast shortly after nine. Of the machines which crossed the Kent coast two dropped bombs on the Isles of Thanet and Sheppey. The remainder crossing the Thames Estuary also approached East London through Essex. Apparently about fifteen machines took part in these attacks of which four or five reached the capital and dropped bombs in various districts between nine and ten p.m.

Forty-seven persons were killed and 169 injured in last night's raid, it is announced officially. All the victims of the raid were killed or wounded in London except for the death of one person and injury of several. The material damage was not serious. The loss of life in last night's raids was the heaviest caused by any of the new series of German aerial attacks which began early this winter after a period of several weeks in which no such ventures were attempted. The casualty list is the largest since the raid of June 13th, when 97 persons were killed and 487 wounded. The last previous raid was on Dec. 18th, when ten persons were killed and 70 wounded.

Replying to questions in the Commons, James Ian Macpherson Parliamentary Secretary for the War Office said that some of the casualties in last night's air raid were due to the overcrowding of raid shelters. Macpherson said that 70 British airmen went up to search for enemy machines. All of them returned safely.

### ITALIANS ATTACK.

BERLIN, Jan. 29. The Italians launched a violent attack yesterday on the northern mountain front between the Asiago and Brenta Rivers, says the official statement issued last evening.

### RED GUARDS WIN.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 29. The Red Guard has won complete control of Helsinki, the capital of Finland, a Stockholm dispatch to the National Tidende reports. It is not known whether the Finnish Government officials escaped from the Revolutionaries.

### KILLED IN A FIGHT.

HARBIN, Manchuria, Jan. 29. Twenty-two persons were killed in a fight at Tomsk when the Bolsheviks broke up a meeting of the Workmen's and Soldiers' Delegates. Despatches received from Blagovest Chensk, in Siberia, the capital of the Province of Amur, says that the Bolsheviks have wrecked the local assembly and that fighting and robbery are general. Russian Consul General Popoff at Harbin is on his way to Peking to present to representatives of the Entente Allies a plan for raising a force to free Eastern Siberia of the Bolsheviks and protest against Austro-German prisoners being released. It is stated that the prisoners have been given a free hand and that hundreds of them have been permitted to return home.

### U. S. SHIPPING AND SUBS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29. In the twelve months of unrestricted warfare launched against Ameri-
