A taxi driver charged with acting in a loose and disorderly manner on the public street, was let go upon payment of costs.

The hearing of the case of a taxi driver who was summoned at the instance of another motorist for driving a car at an excessive speed over the Horse Cove Line on the evening of July 18th, occupied the attention of the court for a lengthy period.

Gaol for Solicitor

"DISGRACED AN HONOURABLE NAME."—JUDGES STERN WORDS IN PASSING SENTENCE.

"You have disgraced an honourable name and brought discredit on a great and honourable profession." With these words Mr. Justice Acton, at Durham Assizes passed sentence of four years' penal servitude on Henry Percy Douglas, 55, a well-known crook solicitor, who had pleaded guilty to three charges of forgery and fraudulent conversion.—Mr. Walter Hedley, who prosecuted, stated that accused enjoyed a very extensive practice, and the complete confidence of people in the Crook neighbourhood. In his examination at the Bankruptcy Court his deficiency was stated to be £23,000, and he admitted that he had embezzled, or done away with, clients' money to the extent of £14,271, and that money had been taken from the pockets of over sixty clients. He attributed his failure to speculation in a cinema venture.—Mr. Mortimer, K.C., on behalf of the accused, pleaded that Douglas bore a name honoured in the country. He was the son of a man of the highest repute in the mining world, started with the prospect of doing well in his profession, and yet, after 30 years of honourable practice, that state of affairs was disclosed. For 20 years he was clerk to Crook Urban Council; for 10 years clerk to Town Law Council, and for 20 years agent at Crook for Messrs. Barclays Bank. At the close of his unfortunate career, in a cinema speculation with another man, who proved to be a man of straw, Douglas found himself burdened with enormous liabilities, and got into the hands of money-lenders. Paying extortionate rates of interest, he found that he could not possibly pay the liabilities he had incurred, and he had made a frank confession of all his transactions. Mr. Justice Acton, in passing sentence, pointed out that prisoner had availed himself of the confidence reposed in his integrity and learning by systematically and with great determination, defrauding clients of that which they had entrusted to him. Everybody must feel pity for him, but everybody must feel much greater sympathy for his unfortunate victim.

Our Paper Pounds

There is no chance of adopting the suggestion of Professor Gustav Cassel that the British Government and the banks should begin to issue sovereigns and half-sovereigns again and withdraw paper money.

Professor Cassel's reasons are not on hygienic grounds, although over 140,000 bacteria have been discovered on a single Treasury note. His appeal to Britain to reintroduce gold coinage is based on nothing like that. He wants us to set an example to other nations, and emphasize the value of the gold standard.

A Treasury authority informed the writer that there is not the slightest prospect of any immediate return to gold currency.

"There is a new price level since the war. Far more money is in circulation," he said. "The sovereigns, half-sovereigns, and the bullion of the Bank of England and the banks could not meet the requirements in a re-introduced gold currency, taking into account the reserves which must be held at the Bank of England."

"One cannot expect a return to gold currency at the earliest before 1929."

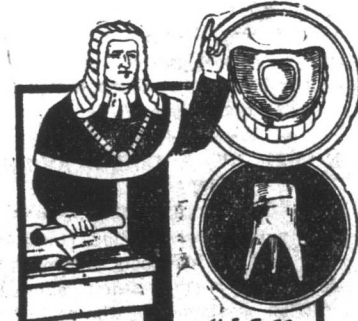

ment for life obtainable at any post office by paying down lump sums. The sum paid to obtain £100 a year for life varies, of course, with the expectation of life.

The Government finds that people are living so much longer that they have had to put up the price of annuities. Whereas £100 used to buy for a man of sixty a payment of £9 12s. 7d. a year for the rest of his life,

in future it will only buy him an annuity of £8 19s. 2d.

It has been found that in the twenty years from 1900 to 1920, the number of male annuitants who died was only 88 out of each 100 expected to die, and in the case of women only 81 out of each 100.

Bad for the Government, but how good for the nation! May the improvement continue!

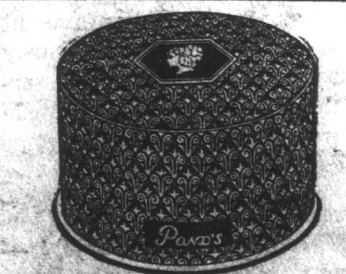
