

Proposed Security Pact Will Be Discussed In Parliament

Britain's Army of Unemployed Increasing
—Canada's Claim in the North Defined—
Norwegian Relief Ship Within the Arctic Circle.

WILL GO TO PARLIAMENT FIRST.
LONDON, June 10. Premier Baldwin to-day told the House of Commons that the security pact had been concluded with France, and some would be concluded without Parliament being given an opportunity for full discussion.

LABORITES OPPOSE PACT.
LONDON, June 10. While the proposed security pact negotiated with France at Geneva by Foreign Secretary Chamberlain is certain to meet strong criticism in the

creased during the week ending June 6th by 60,778, the most formidable addition in a long time. The total unemployed numbers 1,247,300, which is 244,388 more than a year ago.

PLACE BLAME ON POLICE.
TOKIO, June 10. The Chinese legation here, acting on instructions from Peking, to-day issued a statement blaming the constables of the municipal council for the riots at Shanghai, and claiming the students' demonstrations were neither anti-foreign nor pro-bolshevik.

CANADA'S CLAIM.
OTTAWA, June 10. Canada's claim to the northern archipelago was again asserted in the House of Commons to-day by Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior. Tabling a large map, Stewart said that the Canadian claim was to the islands lying north of the Canadian mainland up to the North Pole. The limits of Canada's claim, as indicated on the map formed a great triangle with the mainland as the base and the North Pole as the apex. The western boundary was a continuation of the boundary between Canada and Alaska. The eastern took a line up Davis Straits, between Canada and Greenland, and then followed longitude 60 west to the Pole. Mr. Stewart roughly defined the territory claimed by Canada as that lying north of Canada, west of Greenland between 60 and 142.

OTTAWA NEWSPAPERS CONFIDENT THERE WILL BE AN ELECTION.
OTTAWA, June 10. Both the Journal and Citizen are confident that the elections of the Dominion will go to the polls sometime this year to register their votes in a general election. While the Citizen asserts that dissolution will probably occur in September, the elections in October, the Journal says between now and November the people will go to the polls.

SENATOR MCGILL DEAD.
SHEMUS, Ont., June 10. Senator Alexander McGill, aged 84, died at his home here to-day.

FROM THE RELIEF SHIP.
ABOARD S. S. INGENTRE, June 10. The relief ship Ingentre crossed the Arctic Circle at 8 o'clock this morn-

ing en route to Spitzbergen with the Norwegian Government's expedition in search of the Amundsen-Ellsworth Polar fliers.

GENERAL STRIKE IN FOOCHOW.
FOOCHOW, June 10. A general strike has been proclaimed here. The situation is quiet but strained.

FOREIGNERS REMOVED FROM DANGER ZONE.
CANTON, June 10. All foreigners have been evacuated from the danger zone.

B.C. MINERS OFFER REDUCTIONS.
NANAIMO, B.C., June 10. At a mass meeting of the underground employees of the Western Fuel Company, at noon yesterday, it was decided to re-open negotiations with the Company looking to a settlement of the wage dispute. In the new proposals the men are willing to accept a reduction of twenty cents a day in the wages of miners, ten cents for drivers and no reduction in wages for men earning less than four dollars a day.

CANADA'S LIABILITIES.
OTTAWA, June 10. Retrenchment in expenditure and reduction of public debt must be accomplished if Canada is to be saved from national disaster, Senator McMeans stated in the Senate yesterday. He asserted that with her railway commitments, Canada's national liabilities had reached the neighbourhood of \$3,333,000,000, and he asserted the debt was increasing.

MONTREAL'S HEAT WAVE.
MONTREAL, June 10. While Montreal's heat wave abated to some extent to-day, two more lives were added to the already heavy toll. The maximum temperature yesterday was 82 and late in the evening it had fallen to 63. Since the inauguration of Montreal's "safety first" week, 17 persons have died of violent deaths, nine being heat victims.

PAINLEVE RABAT.
RABAT, June 10. Premier Painleve arrived here this afternoon by airplane from France and will spend two days inspecting the Franco-Moroccan war front.


ROYAL ARCH MASONS IN CONVOCA-TION.
HALIFAX, June 10. The annual convocation of the most excellent Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons, of Nova Scotia, Edward Island, and Newfoundland, was held here last night in the new Masonic Hall. P. J. Otto, of Dartmouth, was re-elected Grand High Priest, and W. H. Hynes, St. John's, Newfoundland, was elected Grand Scribe. It was announced that the Grand Council at its next meeting would consider the matter of holding the next annual convocation of Grand Chapter at St. John's, Nfld.
