HARMAN IS THE MAN FOR THE DEMOCRATS

The Governor of Ohio Seems to be Right in Line For Nomination

STRONGER THAN GAYNOR BECAUSE HE IS TRIED

And it is Understood That He is Right Upon all of the Democrat Issues.

Washington April 9.—Democratic presidential politics, which have been rumbling in the distance, and showing frequent signs of outbreak in congress, burst upon Washington today with a vigor which promises to make it a live subject from this time forth to the adjournment of the session.

The Chicago Tribune's poll of Democratic editors and judges Harmon's interview setting forth his attitude upon public questions were published simultaneously in the eastern newspapers today. The result has been to loosen Democratic tongues and bring

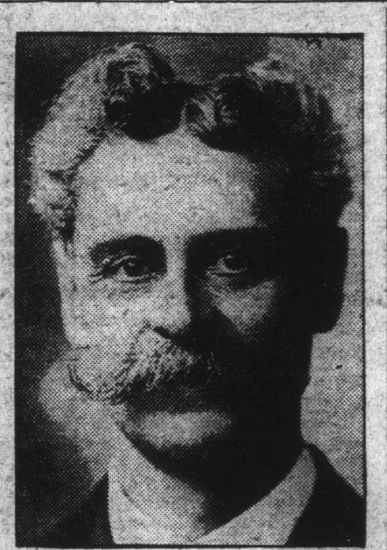
forth some emphatic statements which indicate that Gov. Harmon at the present moment is the choice of a majority of influential Democrats for the presidential nomination.

The Tribune's poll of Democratic editors, showing 418 Bryan and 414 for Harmon, has aroused more interest today than Gov. Harmon's interview upon political subjects. Democratic leaders declare they have been satisfied in their own minds that Harmon is "right" on the big issues of Democracy; but they profess surprise at the results shown by the poll of Democratic newspapers.

Only Local Defeat Can Hurt Harmon It is the consensus of opinion in Democratic circles that nothing but disastrous defeat in the Ohio elections next fall can prevent Gov. Harmon from being the Democratic presidential candidate in 1912. The Democratic leaders who make this statement are equally emphatic in saying there is no genuine sentiment throughout the country for another nomination for Mr. Bryan.

The large number of votes polled for Bryan in The Tribune canvass is not regarded as an indication of his actual strength. It is declared to be rather a vote of confidence from his long time friends. It is believed that if the balance of the votes registered in The Tribune poll had been compelled to divide themselves between Bryan and Harmon, the latter would have made by far the greater gain.

SHE OUTWITTED MOUNTED POLICE

Woman and Her Two Children After Many Vain Attempts to Escape Manage to Elude Police

Skagway, April 9.—Many cunning criminals have exhausted their cleverness and tried in vain to escape from the Yukon under the watchful eyes of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, but actuated by motives of mother love and fearful that she would lose possession of her children, Mrs. F. D. Cameron, well known throughout the Yukon for her husband running the roadhouse at Indian river on the White Pass stage trail, escaped from Whitehorse last Monday, with her two little girls, eluding and fairly outwitting the mounted police who had orders to detain her two children.

Twice had Mrs. Cameron boarded the White Pass & Yukon train at Whitehorse bound for Skagway, and both times the mounted police, who searched the train each morning, discovered her and forcibly removed her children under orders from the Dawson sheriff. Mrs. Cameron was determined to escape from the Yukon with her children for once she was on United States soil, the Dawson court have no jurisdiction. So last Monday her husband started at 10 o'clock, dressed herself and her two little children, and cautiously made her way to the outskirts of the town, luckily without encountering any of the police patrols.

Carrying her youngest child, Lottie, a little tot of three years, and leading Doris, who is four years old by the hand, Mrs. Cameron started out through the darkness along the White Pass & Yukon railroad track. Alone, save for her children, and with no protection from real and imaginary perils, the long walk through the darkness along the railroad track that is hemmed in on either side by thick timber, the experience would have daunted any woman not driven on by the all-impelling love for her children.

When morning dawned Mrs. Cameron had traversed about five miles and although she was completely exhausted by her long tramp over the slushy roadbed, carrying her little child all the way, she placed another two or three miles before her. She was before she sat down to rest.

Shortly after 8 o'clock the morning train for Skagway came along and Mrs. Cameron flagged it. With her children she was taken without question and reached Skagway without any further molestation. The police of Whitehorse did not discover her escape until the train had passed the boundary line and was on Alaskan soil. Had they known earlier in the day of her escape she would have undoubtedly been removed from the train at Summit by the Canadian customs authorities.

Mrs. Cameron recently left her husband, who runs the roadhouse at Indian River, because of alleged cruelty on his part. With her two children she went to Dawson and then came out to Whitehorse over the trail. There has been no legal separation and the children are in the custody of Mrs. Cameron for the custody of the children. Pending a hearing of the case the court instructed the sheriff of the Whitehorse police to detain the children in the Yukon. Mrs. Cameron is now out of the jurisdiction of the court and the children cannot be taken from her by any process of law unless she re-enters Canadian soil, and she is pretty sure not to do this, for she is leaving for the States on an American boat.
