A meal within the walls of the Middlesex county jail is something which none can boast of having except the men, women and boys who, by the folly of their ways, have been compelled by the arm of the law to serve time.

In fact, the general public have but little or no conception of the bill of fare that is generally provided the prisoners. An "Advertiser" representative was accorded, and gladly accepted the privilege of visiting the county jail while dinner was being served yesterday. He found between 25 and 30 hungry men in the different wards shortly before 12 o'clock, and a huge boiler on the kitchen stove containing the soup for the noonday meal. The kitchen was "as clean as a new pin," so to speak, although it did not contain the most modern furniture or such cooking utensils as are usually found in the kitchen of a household. The stove is a very large affair-about twice as large as a good-sized range-but it is beginning to show signs of old age. The boilers and smaller vessels used in the preparation of the rations are copper, and also indicate by their appearance that they have done service for many a

The office of cook does not have attached to it any handsome salary. It is filled by one of the male prisoners, who works under the direction of the turnkeys. Hugh McCurdy is the cook at present. tables were rotten was considered to be a "stretcher," as all the supplies for the jail are first-class.

"The men are always given plenty," eaid the turnkey, a rather portly gentleman. "You would wonder how some of them could empty all the dishes that are set before them.'

It might be supposed by many that a person confined in the jail would

lose flesh in consequence of the rations, but the very opposite invariably proves to be the case. On being released after serving a term of a month or more, a man has a decidedly healthy and cleanly appearance. The turnkey above referred to assured the newspaper man "that old Jack Turner, who serves numerous terms for vagrancy and drunkenness, generally gains about fifteen pounds in weight in a month or six weeks." He accounts for this from the fact that the meals are regularly supplied in the jail, and also that eleven or eleven and a half

hours' sleep is secured every night. Under the method in vogue in many jails in the old country, Middlesex prisoners, no matter what their offenses or the length of their terms, receive the same rations.

The average cost of maintaining a prisoner in the jail is about 5 cents a day, or \$18 25 a year. To many this can hardly seem possible, but the returns of Governor Kelly will show such to be the case.

The struggling desperado dragged her into the hall and to the stairway. She clung to him, and they fell to the bottom of the stairs. Policeman George Brauwald and the bartender, who had started for home, found Mrs. Colligan and the burglar on their knees.

In Barrett's pocket was found \$354 82, which he had taken from the satchel. He admitted to Chief Murphy that he knew Mrs. Colligan had money to cash the checks for railroad men. He refused to tell how he got in, but he probably sneaked in through the saloon. He said he was John Ward, of No. 330 East Twenty-eighth street, New York. Chief Murphy recognized him at sight.
