**Embro Would Have Toll Roads Assumed and Maintained by County.**

The bylaw establishing a public market in Meaford comes into force on June 1.

Percy, son of Joseph Hainstock, of Port Huron, was thrown to the ground by a cow, and had his left arm broken below the elbow.

The St. Thomas City Council's decision on the question of submitting a bylaw to raise \$45,000 for a new City Hall has been broken.

There are 67 persons in the township of East Zorra over 70 years of age, and one of them has reached the advanced age of 93 years.

Mr. C. E. Moyer, of Berlin, has been appointed deputy sheriff of the county to the late Mr. Joseph Hunt, and took charge of the books on Monday morning.

The Chatham City Council has awarded the Silica-Bartley Stone Company of Ingersoll, all the stone sidewalks required during the year, at 14 cents per foot.

Rev. W. E. Scott, who has been rector of Ridgeway, for some years, has been compelled to resign his parish in consequence of ill-health.

Carrie Boyes, eldest daughter of Fred J. and Agnes Mayhew, died on Friday, May 14, in San Francisco, Cal., after an illness of two weeks. The body will be brought to Thamesville for interment.

One of the features of the jubilee celebration at Woodstock is to be a reunion of the pioneers of Oxford county. It is estimated that there are about 800 pioneers over 70 years of age in the county.

Dundas Street Methodist Church, Woodstock, has extended a call to the Rev. Mr. Casswell, who occupied the pulpit of Central Methodist Church of its pastor, Rev. J. R. Gundy. Mr. Gundy will remain in Windsor another year at least.

The death of Philip Lovley, in Port Huron, was a surprise to all his friends, as he was a well-known and popular man. He was 22 years of age, and had been a trusted employee of the Port Huron and Sarnia Ferry Company.

At Woodstock on Monday, County Judge Pinkie sentenced Henry Morrison, a harness-maker, to eighteen months with hard labor in the Central Prison for indecent assault upon Mary McGee, on the 26th of last month. Complainant is the daughter of the woman with whom Morrison boarded.

At a meeting of the quarterly board of the Windsor Avenue Methodist Church, Windsor, a resolution was passed expressing a high appreciation of the high character and deportment of its pastor, Rev. J. R. Gundy. Mr. Gundy will remain in Windsor another year at least.

A meeting called by Mayor O'Donoghue, of Stratford, for the purpose of considering the proposed Victorian Order of Nurses which Lady Aberdeen is promoting, was very well attended. It seems to be the general feeling that such an order would interfere with the work done by the local hospital staff.

The members of the Embro council are all of one opinion on the toll roads question, which was embodied in the following resolution, a copy of which is sent to the county clerk: "Resolved, that this council would favor: 1. The abolition of toll roads in the county. 2. The assuming and maintaining of all bridges and all leading roads by the county."

Rev. D. Strachan, of Rockwood, for over twenty years pastor of the Presbyterian church at Rockwood and Eden Mills, has decided to give up his charges and will remove to Guelph. His resignation is in the hands of the Guelph Presbytery, and will be dealt with this afternoon. Rev. Strachan is well up in years, and his long and faithful service merits a rest from his arduous labors. His wide circle of friends will wish him many years of future happiness.

Miss L. K. Commander, a former pupil of St. Mary's Collegiate Institute, whose family lived at Medina, according to the Chicago Chronicle, the only woman preacher who occupies a Unitarian pulpit. She has a church at Baraboo, and is making quite a hit with her preaching. She is of English descent, a Canadian by birth, and was brought up strictly in the faith of the English Church. She graduated from the Western University in London, and her theological studies at home. The Unitarian Society at Baraboo is one of the oldest in the State of Wisconsin.

A serious accident occurred on the Grand Trunk at Jeannet's Creek on Monday afternoon. A derrick, which was being placed on a flat-car for the purpose of raising the railway bridge over the creek, was overturned, and swung off. A gang of fifteen men were engaged in the work. A. R. Anderson, of Chatham, jumped off to the edge of the creek to save himself, and hurt himself badly. Dan Morrison, of Stratford, engineer of the raising gang, had his head badly cut. John Nichol, of Windsor, also had his head cut and severely bruised. A young man from London was seriously injured in the fall.

**COMING WEST.**  
The New Conductor General Manager of the Merchants Bank.

Halifax, N. S., May 19.—Thomas Fyvie, who is to be conductor general manager of the Merchants Bank of Canada at Montreal, came to the country from Scotland to enter the employ of the Bank of British North America as secretary to the manager in the Montreal office. After a period of service there he went to New York, where he conducted business. Returning to Canada he joined the Bank of Nova Scotia agency at St. John, and from there he came to the Halifax office. During the illness of the then cashier, W. C. Menzies, he served in that capacity, and on Mr. Menzies' death Mr. Fyvie was made cashier, a position for which his great talents eminently fitted him, and which he has now held for some 22 years. During Mr. Fyvie's management the capital of the Bank of Nova Scotia has trebled. The fame of the Bank of Nova Scotia as a solid monetary institution is now known over the whole continent.

**SHOT IN THE HEAD.**  
Joseph Racine Charged With Murdering an Old Man.

Montreal, Que., May 19.—Joe Racine, a former well-known resident of Montreal, has been arrested at Rouss Point on a charge of murdering Leon Mailloux, whose body was found in a swamp near that place on Jan. 8. Racine has been lodged in the Plattsburg jail.

Leon Mailloux, the victim of the alleged murder, was about 74 years old. He came to Rouss Point from Springfield in December, 1896, to visit friends. It was said that he had several hundred dollars in his possession. On Dec. 24, he left his baggage at the hotel, and departed, saying he would be back in a few days. He was never seen alive again. On the morning of Jan. 8 last the partly burned body of a man was found in the great reservation near Fort Montgomery, a little way from Rouss Point. Investigation showed that it was the body of Mailloux. It had been burned by some sort of acid, but was identified by the wooden stockings, which still remained upon him. The coroner's inquest developed the fact that Mailloux had been shot in the head by the jury gave that as the cause of his death. The burning was to prevent identification, but did not fully accomplish its purpose.

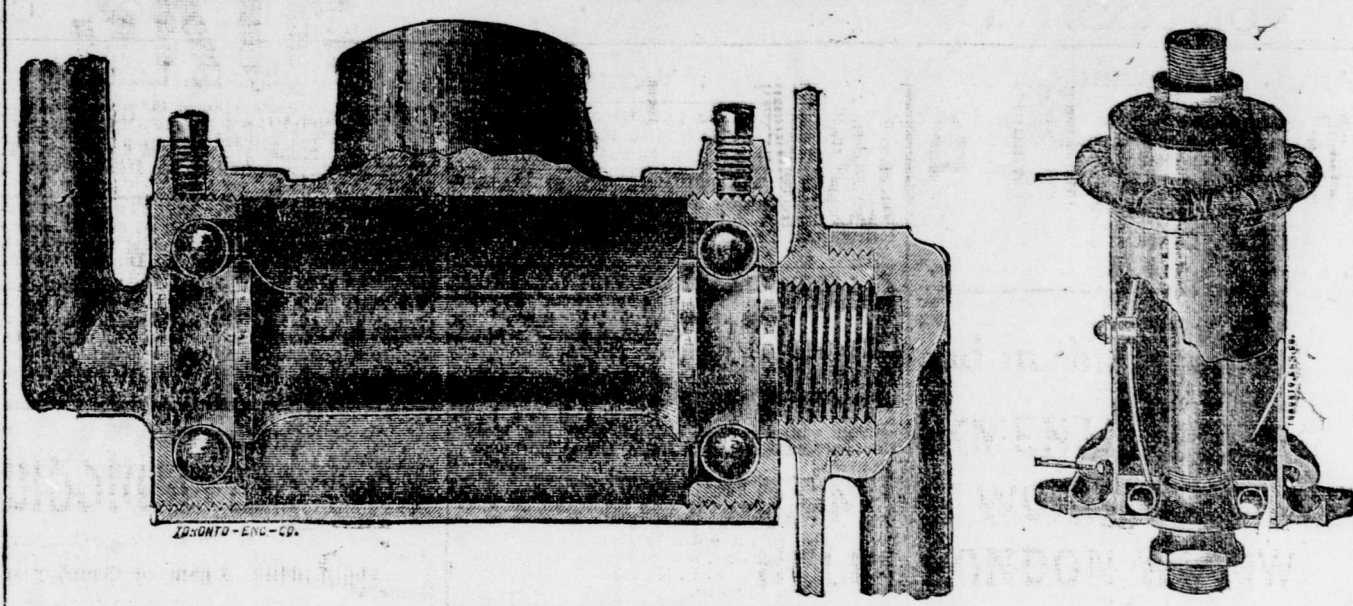
Racine was formerly a well known saloon keeper in this city. The authorities claim to have a strong case against him. The examination has been set for June 1.

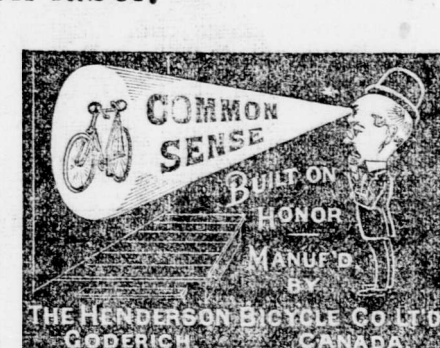
