BURNED OUT.
Three Firemen Injured by Falling Walls—Long Branch, Guests Have to Hustle.
PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 19.—Fire today destroyed the Hennessy and Conney buildings on Canal street. Three firemen were slightly injured by falling walls. Loss, \$125,000.

HOPES OF THE ALLIANCE.
The Farmer's Party Expect to Emerge Both Republicans and Democrats.
OTTAWA, July 19.—Mr. Henry L. Loucks, of South Dakota, the new President of the Farmers' Alliance of the United States, is here on a short visit to his parents. Mr. Loucks was at one time postmaster at Hull. He is now on his way to Washington, where he will complete preparations for the coming Presidential and Congressional campaign. He says the Farmers' Alliance leaders believe their candidates will carry Kansas, Colorado, Wisconsin and Minnesota in the west, and also Georgia, two Carolinas, Florida, and probably Texas in the south. This would throw the election of President into the House, while the Senate would have to choose the Vice-President.

WITH THE WORKINGMEN.

Labor Day Celebration in Halifax—The Carnegie Employees.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 19.—This was Labor Day in Halifax. It was observed throughout the city as a complete holiday. A procession marched through the city, consisting of about 2,000 artisans with half a dozen bands. This evening band concerts in public gardens wound up the day.

LEBANON, Pa., July 19.—The First Brigade was this morning ordered home. The whole brigade broke camp, and is now on the way to Philadelphia.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 19.—Secretary Lovejoy, of the Carnegie works, says: We will have no trouble to get all the men here we need. We already have applications from enough, and we do not even accept all who have applied here in person, to say nothing of the applications we get by letter.

HOMESTEAD, Pa., July 19.—The meeting of the advisory committee to-night resulted in charges being given out that the Carnegie managers were resorting to peculiar methods to force men to go to work. The case of Jas. Close and another man were cited in which it was alleged success was achieved by threats to implicate them in pending legal proceedings.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 19.—An Associated Press reporter to-day found about 150 men at work in the Homestead mills, most of them new employees. Four turnouts in the armor plate department were charged to-day, and a complete resumption in this department will take place to-morrow.

TORONTO TOPICS.

Death of a Wealthy Citizen—A Railway Man Fatally Hurt.
TORONTO, July 19.—Joseph Keterson, a wealthy citizen, died Sunday and was buried to-day. He had amassed a fortune computed at \$250,000, and having no relatives, all his fortune is left to charities.
Chas. Miller, C. P. R. section man, was thrown from a trolley into a culvert about a mile and a half from North Toronto Sunday night, and fractured his skull. He will likely die.

The Board of Trade's St. John's relief fund has reached \$8,555 and the total from Toronto is cash over \$25,000, including the \$10,000 from the Ontario Government.

Fell Heir to Half a Million Dollars—Mr. Gilmor, of Charlotte, N. B., Consumed in His Seat.
Mrs. William Billings, of Owen Sound, has fallen heir to \$500,000.
The corner stone of the second Baptist church was laid in Guelph by Hon. John Dryden.

Assistance has been sent from Montreal to the four coal-laden barges ashore near Oswego.
The election petition against Mr. Gilmor, M.P. for Charlotte, N.B., was dismissed on Tuesday.

The remains of Hon. Mr. Robeson, late Premier of British Columbia, have arrived at Montreal from England.
Immediately upon receipt of the news of his election for Longford, Mr. Costigan called his congratulations to Mr. Blake.

The funeral of the late Alfred Patrick, ex-clerk of the House of Commons, took place Tuesday afternoon to Beechwood Cemetery.
The managing director of the Montreal Street Railway Company says that city will have a complete system of electric cars running within nine months.

Mr. Kennedy, F. Burns, M. P. for Gloucester, has been nominated for the lieutenant-governorship of New Brunswick, and is industriously supported.
Rudyard Kipling, the Anglo-Indian author, is in Montreal. He was tendered a reception Tuesday night. After a few days' stay he will leave for England.

The Montreal City Council on Tuesday afternoon awarded the 30 years' franchise for an electric street railway to the Montreal City Railway Company. There was an exciting contest between the street railway company and the Williams syndicate, of New York.

A Buffalo dispatch says: John Gates, a carpenter residing in Guelph, Ont., Canada, who attempted to pass the customs inspector at the International Bridge, was sent back with the warning that the next time he sets foot on the American soil it had better be as an immigrant.

Wm. Worden, aged 18 years, son of Mr. Daniel Worden, employed on the farm of Mr. M. Purdee, through whose farm the Loop Line Railway runs, was walking on the track Monday morning when he was struck by the express and instantly killed.

A JEALOUS COW.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES

The News of the Day, Culled and Condensed.

Mrs. Rose Terry Cooke, the authoress, died at Pittsfield, Mass., on Monday.
Thomas Cook, founder of "Cook's Excursions," has died at London from paralysis.
The Earl of Orkney has married the popular gaily burlesque actress, Connie Gilchrist.

Mrs. L. D. Acevedo and three children were murdered a week ago at Cincero Ranch, Ark., probably by Apache Indians.
Typhus fever and cholera are spreading in South Russia. Great mortality has already resulted from this new visitation.
The Chesapeake and Ohio grain elevator at Richmond, Va., was destroyed by fire Monday night. A loaded coal train was partly burned. Loss, \$100,000.

The Italian steamer Citta di Roma, 1,508 tons, sailing in the United States and Brazilian Mail Steamship Company's service, caught fire shortly after leaving Rio Janeiro.
Madame Isadora Yoon, wife of Isadora Yoon, a farmer of La Presentation, St. Hyacinthe county, Que., committed suicide Monday by jumping into a well. She was out of her mind.

Dr. Charles Scudder, aged 35, son of Hon. Henry J. Scudder, committed suicide at Northport, L. I., on Monday morning. He leaves a wife and 7-year-old daughter.
The second annual congress of the American Whist League opened in New York on Tuesday in the theater of the Manhattan Athletic Club. Between 300 and 400 delegates, representing 47 clubs, are in attendance.

Frank Rowland and Jas. Doyle, partner convicts, serving five years in the Ohio Penitentiary at Columbus, each agreed to commit suicide. Rowland killed himself Sunday night, and Doyle became insane. Rowland left a confession.

The U. S. Senate amendment, increasing from \$316,000 to \$500,000 the appropriation for the Government exhibit at the World's Fair, was non-concurred in. Yeas 129, nays 65. All the amendments increasing the appropriations for the World's Columbian commission were non-concurred in by bulk.

A cordial and satisfactory settlement has been reached between the Governments of the United States and Chili respecting the indemnity to be paid by the latter on account of the assaults made upon the crew of the United States steamer Baltimore. Seventy-five thousand dollars is to be distributed among the families of the two men who lost their lives, and to the surviving members of the crew who were wounded.

Grand Trunk Railway traffic returns for the week ending July 16, 1922, were \$89,168. Corresponding week in 1921, \$85,343. Increase in 1922, \$3,825.
Canadian Pacific Railway returns from July 7 to July 14, 1922, \$421,000; 1921, \$389,000. Increase \$32,000.
