TONS OF BRAWN AND MUSCLE!

Some Odd and Interesting Statistics
About London's Police Force.

It Is Physically and Mentally the Finest in All Canada--

Average Height of London Policeman Is 6 Feet 1-2

Inch, and Average Weight 198 3-4 Pounds.

When residents of London lay their
heads on their pillows at night and
prepare to enjoy the rest which their
labors of the day have earned them,
they give little or no thought to the
men who, watchful and alert, are pac-
ing the lonely streets through the long,
cold nights of winter, or the equally
trying sultry nights of summer. Yet
it is due largely to the presence of
these men and their faithful observa-
nce of their duty that Londoners can
sleep at night in confident safety;
and rarely are their numbers distur-
bed by the nocturnal prowlers who
would abound in all large centers of
population were it not for the restrain-
ing influence of the police. There is
not in the city any class of men more
deserving of public esteem than the
stalwart and efficient body of men
who compose the police force of which
London has every right to feel proud.
They have shown time after time that
they are ready to do their duty at
any cost, of injury or even death.
While the lot of a policeman in Lon-
don, with its comparative immunity

from dangerous and desperate charac-
ters, and its total freedom from slums
and "tough" neighborhoods, would
seem to be much better than that of
the guardian of the peace in other
cities, where making an arrest in cer-
tain quarters entails the facing of an
angry mob whose dearest desire is to
"kill de cop," still the shooting of De-
tective Harry Phair some years ago,
the murdering of P. C. Twohey by
Fog-leg Brown, and the recent experi-
ence of Officers Down and Gilson, in
facing desperate men who did not
scruple at using their weapons, are
all evidence that when a London po-
liceman assumes the responsibilities
of his position he assumes too the risk
of being called on to lay down his
life in the discharge of his duty.

Believing that some information
about these important servants of the
city would interest the public whom
they serve so well, an Advertiser rep-
resentative compiled the following sta-

A comparison of the London police
force with that of Hamilton will prob-
ably be interesting to readers of The
Advertiser, and an opportunity for do-
ing so afforded by the publication of
a table corresponding to the above in
the Hamilton Herald of March 16 last.
Hamilton is provided with 50 men to
the Hamilton 40 officers of 5 feet 6 in-
ches and over, and the London police
limits of her 2,000 acres, while London,
with her 137 miles of streets and her
area of 5,900 acres, manages with 10
less policemen. Whether or not the dif-
ference in number can be accounted for
by the inherent wickedness and
crime with which Hamilton is popu-
larly credited it is not the purpose of
this article to discuss. The aggregate
weight of Hamilton's bluecoats is
9,565 pounds, or an average of about
191 1/2 pounds, while the total weight
of the members of the local police
shows 7,948 pounds, or an average of
198 3/4 pounds. The average height of
the Hamilton officers is 5 feet 6 1/2 in-
ches, while London's sturdy constables
average 6 feet 1 1/2 inch. Thus, if any ques-
tion arose as to physical superiority,
the policeman from the Forest City
would have the advantage of his an-
tagonist from under the hill by 1-5
pounds weight and 1 1/2 inches in
height.

As the total weight of the London
force has been given, perhaps the total
height may also be set down. It is
241 feet 6 inches, and this means that
if the members were to combine as a
big acrobatic troupe and form a hu-
man pillar by standing on each other's
heads, the twelfth man from the

ground would overlook the Masonic
Temple, while the living apex of the
pillar would look down scornfully on
the highest spire in London, and would
give a view of the city and its en-
vironment that could be otherwise ob-
tainable only from a balloon.

Then, think of what is represented by
the 7,948 pounds, which makes up
the total weight of London's finest. If
it were possible to mould all this
brawn and sinew into one gigantic
policeman, he would be about 150 feet
high and have a chest measurement
of about 1,050 inches. The startled be-
holder of such a spectacle would surely
read new meanings in the phrase,
"the awful majesty of the law."

Again, think of the deterrent effect it
would have upon criminals, if they
could only be made to understand that
in seeking to follow a career of crime
in London they are opposed by nearly
four tons of solid muscle and bone,
which is equivalent to the size of a
healthy, well-grown elephant. Even
the most desperate of characters would
pause and ask himself if it would not
be better to desist from his evil course
and either go to work or obtain a
