The aggregate weight of Hamilton's bluecoats is 9,563 pounds, or an average of about 1911/2 pounds, while the totalled weight of the members of the local police shows 7,948 pounds, or an average of 198½ pounds. The average height of the Hamilton officer is 5 feet 11 inches, while London's sturdy constables average 6 feet ½ inch.
