MUNICIPALITY HAS POWER TO PREVENT.

Trading Stamp Concerns Must Go If Council Says So.

The court of appeal at Toronto has given judgment on the stated case by the attorney-general as to whether the legislature had power to pass the act of 1901 giving municipalities the power to prohibit trading stamp concerns operating within their own boundaries.

The court answered in the affirmative. Toronto City Council took advantage of the act last year, and trading stamp concerns in the city were closed on Jan. 1 last. Announcements were made by the companies that they had closed down temporarily until the court of appeal had given its decision as to the power of the legislature to pass the act.

COL. LEYS IS RUSHING WORK FOR THE NEW FISH HATCHERY

Well-Known Expert Has Looked Over the Ground for Suitable Site.

Arrangements for the construction of the fish hatchery, which, at Col. Leys' suggestion, the Ontario Government will construct here, are progressing satisfactorily.

Mr. A. White, of Orwell, the noted fish expert, was in London and vicinity all day Wednesday looking after a site and visiting the different ponds near here.

Mr. White is the only man in Canada who has made a success of hatching bass, and until running properly, the new hatchery will be under his direct supervision.

CHAIRMAN WAS NOT PLEASED. Ald. Cooper Annoyed at Proposal to Leave Business Over.

Delay Should Not Be Caused by Mayor's Absence, He Said—The Work Transacted.

Ald. Cooper was irritated at last night's meeting of the board of works, because it was proposed that certain matters should be laid over, as the mayor was not on hand to talk them over.

"We do not have to wait until our mayor comes back from a horse show in Boston to do business," the chairman angrily exclaimed when the proposal was made.

The following insufficiently signed petitions against cement walks were filed: Mrs. Annie Taylor, against walk on Orchard street; John Arthur, Elizabeth street; between Elias and Queen's avenue; between Cartwright street and Prospect avenue.

Petitions from the Carling Brewing and Malting Company and others for standing the mayor's absence, Ald. Cooper was prepared to consider any business which might be ready, but the other members thought it better to hold one or two over.

The petitions of W. McDaniel for cement walk on Egerton street, from Dundas street to G. T. R.; J. S. Pearce for an eight-inch tile sewer on Talbot street; Albert street north; William Wyatt for an eight-inch sewer on St. James street, between Waterloo and Colborne streets; and Joshua, Garnier, for a nine-inch sewer on Oxford street, between Malting and William streets, were ordered to be advertised under the initiative system.

A memo from the council regarding the initiating of sewers on Colborne street, between Pall Mall street and a point 200 feet south of the south limit of Princess avenue, and on Princess avenue, between Colborne and Maitland streets, was also presented.

Mr. J. Stoddart, who is in charge of the work, was asked to report on the matter. He said that the work was being done as fast as possible.

THE REASON WHY

Capital Punishment Was Abolished in the State of Michigan.

The Detroit News thus answers the following questions put by a correspondent:

To the Editor:—Why do the laws of Michigan not punish by death a party who takes the life of a fellow-creature? Why was it stopped? And is there any specified time that it will be renewed?

Detroit, April 13. M. B. 1. Because the capital punishment in Michigan was abolished by act of the legislature in 1847, this being the first statute in the Union to put an end to the taking of human life under forms of law.

2. Because a majority of the legislators believed that human governments have no right to take life; that the existence of the death penalty led to tender-hearted juries to acquit willful and deliberate criminals, and was brutalizing in its reflex action on the community that inflicted it.

3. No change in the law has been made in this country since the law has been frequently being introduced in the legislature. None of these, in response, and most of them have not even been voted upon, there being no important body of favorable public sentiment behind them.

RECRUITING FOR THE FOURTH CONTINGENT!

Tests Are Strictly Applied and 50 Per Cent of Applicants Are Rejected.

Ottawa, April 18.—The militia department is advised that recruiting for the fourth contingent is progressing satisfactorily throughout Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. The tests are being applied with great strictness, however, not more than 50 per cent of the recruits offering being accepted.

It was expected from the outset that a large proportion of the 2,500 men to be recruited in the Northwest, where the enlistment will not begin until the 24th. A considerable number of men of the permanent corps and of the Northwest Mounted Police will be allowed to enlist.
