AKKOOND OF SWAT BIGRATE WAR ON STARTS HOLY WAR CHICAGO TO EAST

Mad Mullah From Central Asia G. T. R. and Eric Cut Into M. C. R. Figures and Rates May Go Very Low.

Lahore, India, July 4.—A new Mad Mullah named G. T. R. has proclaimed a holy war against the English and has detailed forty subordinate mullahs to go through the Moham-medan territory to urge the inhabitants to rise against the British and drive them out of the country, murdering all who resist.

If the new "Mad Mullah" does as much as the original did, he will make of the Punjab a scene of blood and fire. About five years ago the officials received word that the "Mad Mullah" or "Mad Fakir" was endeavoring to create a rising against the British rule in his stronghold in the Upper Swat Valley, his first move being to stage with a little force of 600 men to attack a neighboring ruler, with who-British sympathies, the Nawab of Dir. This man had headed previous risings against the English, and his methods of warfare were well known to the Government.

The Upper Swat, or Suwat Valley, where this uprising occurred, is a sparsely-populated region in Central Asia, of which only little is known. It had been under the rule of a chief entitled the akkoond, owing to its distance from the British outposts and its inaccessibility nothing further was done toward suppressing the outbreak until a fortnight later, when Simla was startled by the news that the "Mad Fakir" had been successful in his first battle with the Dir tribesmen, he having put them to rout with heavy losses.

His army had increased by this time to over 1,000 men, and the Nawab of Dir had found it expedient to send additional troops to check his advance. The Anglo-Indian war department woke up.

Three days after the first reports began to come in it was learned that the "Mad Mullah's" following was growing to dangerous proportions, and that he was moving in the direction of the Rohat valley, where he would put him in a position to intercept communication with Chitral, one of British strongholds on the frontier. In consequence of this grave state of affairs thousands of persons were ordered to the front and dispersed the rebel's "army," a battle in which scores were killed.



IS ROOT THE MAN?

Apparently Has Been Chosen to Succeed Late Mr. Hay.

Washington, D. C., July 4.—If he can be induced to accept the place, Elihu Root, of New York, former secretary of war, will be the successor of the late John Hay in the cabinet of President Roosevelt. This is the impression in Washington, as the result of a telegram received by Acting Secretary of State Pierce from a confidential source in the State Department.

Pierce will represent the President and the State Department at the funeral of Mr. Hay at the State Department on Wednesday morning. All the cabinet officers will act as honorary pallbearers.

It is known here that Mr. Roosevelt would recall Mr. Root to public service in the latter should find it impossible to accept the office. Undoubtedly the President will consult him in regard to Mr. Hay's departure.

WANTS SCHOOL WRONG RIGHTED; TRUSTEE GAMMAGE'S COMPLAINT

Children Get More Holidays Than They Should—Miss McKenzie Resigns.

At the regular monthly meeting of the board of education yesterday afternoon, a matter affecting the pupils of every public school in London was brought up by Trustee Gammage. The latter said there appeared to be something radically wrong with the school system, because during the two weeks preceding the midsummer holidays—in fact, almost since the annual picnic at Springbank—there had practically been no school. The pupils, he was informed, said the teachers told them after the examinations, that they would not be recorded as absent if they did not attend between that time and the holidays, and the consequence was that the seats were generally empty. This gave them about ten weeks' holidays, instead of two months. Trustee Gammage added that the members of No. 2 committee found that in some of the rooms only one or two pupils were in attendance, while in others there were no scholars whatever. To avoid a repetition of this, Mr. Gammage made the suggestion that the examinations should be held until the last week of the school term. The matter was referred to No. 1 committee.

A resignation which every member of the board regretted was received from Miss Agnes E. McKenzie, superintendent of the kindergartens, who has decided to leave the service of the board. The resignation was accepted, and the trustees passed a resolution expressing their appreciation of the work done by Miss McKenzie in behalf of the kindergartens of the city. Applications for the position were received from Miss Jean R. Laidlaw and Miss Minnie McKinnon. Both were referred to No. 1 committee.

A number of the teachers of the College Institute presented a petition asking that in view of their length of service the present scale of salaries be amended so that their maximum salary may be obtained at an earlier date than is provided for by the scale now in force.

On motion of Trustee Gammage and Fitzgerald the petition was filed. Trustee Gammage expressed the opinion that the teachers of the College Institute had their salaries substantially increased quite recently and he thought they should be satisfied.

Miss Eva L. Williams was granted a four-months' leave of absence owing to ill-health. Mr. B. C. McCann, secretary of the Old Boys' celebration committee, invited the trustees to participate in the procession of the Old Boys on the first Monday in August. The invitation was accepted.

Miss Ida C. Phillips, teacher in Grade II, at Princess avenue school, tendered her resignation. It was accepted with regret, for Miss Phillips was one of the most competent teachers in the employ of the board.

Miss Maud M. Angus, teacher in Grade I, at Princess avenue, asked to be appointed to the place vacated by Miss Phillips. The application was referred to No. 1 committee, as also were applications from the following: E. W. Goss, the Quantz, for position as music mistress in the schools; Misses Rena Black, Legate, Georgina Daly (Stratford), and Ethel Johnston, for positions on the kindergarten staff, and Edith McBride, for a position on the substitute staff of teachers.

The Woodmen of the World (Forest City Camp, No. 1), asked for the privilege of using the rear portion of the Simcoe street school grounds for drill purposes. Granted.

An account for \$404.01 for entrance examination expenses was passed. Inspector Edwards, in his monthly report, called attention to the fact that during the Model School term it has been the custom to amalgamate the junior classes of two schools, which meant the crowding of eighty children into a comparatively small room, not only to the detriment of their health, but also retarding their intellectual and moral development. He suggested that a suitable room be obtained in which the principal could locate the students. The upper east wing of the public library was mentioned as a suitable place for the work. The matter was sent to No. 1 committee.

Inspector Edwards also recommended that the oiling of the floors in the schools be carried out as far as possible. No. 2 committee will, if adopted, will involve a heavy expense.

Trustee MacRobert reported that the purpose had been appointed for the purpose of the school, and the rules and regulations for the schools. The same will be printed and considered later.

Among the accounts passed by No. 1 committee was one for \$100 for ten flag poles for the schools. In this connection it was reported that the flags for the schools, donated by Col. Little, were now ready for distribution, and the board decided to have them floating during the week of the reunion and semi-centennial. A resolution thanking Col. Little for his generous gift was unanimously passed.

The other resolution expressed the thanks of the board to Col. Little for his donation of 100 banners for the school children's picnic, and to all others who in any way contributed to the success of the picnic.

The next regular meeting of the board will not be held until September. The members present were Trustees Yeates (chairman), MacRobert, Fitzgerald, Strong, Blackwell, Gammage, Teasdale, English, Inspector Edwards and Secretary McElhannon.

TO BUILD COTTAGE FOR CONSUMPTIVES CHELSEA GREEN TO HAVE CHURCH

Mr. Thomas McCormick, of This City, Donates \$3,500 for the Purpose.

A few days since Mr. Thomas McCormick, of this city, visited the institutions of the National Sanatorium Association at Muskoka, in company with Mr. S. Grigg, of the Love Mission, and Mr. W. Gage, and Mr. Ambrose Kent, of Toronto.

Besides building the cottage Mr. McCormick will endow in part certain rooms in order to meet the requirements of those patients who pay in whole. Plans in connection with the cottage will be proceeded with without delay, so that the building may be ready for occupancy in the early fall.
