It was thought that as it was a minority meeting, Mr. Graydon should inquire into all the facts of the case and report at the next meeting of the committee. This was decided on.

Another Request.

Mr. E. R. Galpin, Kent street, asked that his sewer rental be reduced. He considered that 25 years was too long to pay for a sewer, and was of the opinion that the time should be materially reduced.

City Engineer Graydon was also of the opinion that 25 years was too long. The citizens must pay 8 cents per foot for that term. Mr. Graydon recommended that the term be ten years at 15 cents per foot. The recommendation will be sent to the council.

Carling Street Paving.

The guarantee of the Carling street paving came up. At a recent meeting of the council it was decided that no guarantee other than that of a responsible guarantee company would be received on the pavement.

Blight & Fielder, the contractors, were unable to obtain a guarantee bond, and appeared before the committee last night to see what arrangements could be made with reference to it.

No Guarantee.

Mr. Fielder, on behalf of the contractors, pointed out that it was impossible to get a guarantee company to put up bonds for the paving. These companies demanded \$25 per thousand, as well as collateral for the full amount of the contract. Later they had refused to give any such terms.

Mr. Matthew Wilson in Chatham told the committee that he would prefer to have the personal bonds of the firm than have the bonds guaranteed by a foreign company. Mr. Fielder said he was willing to give a joint bond with the

In short, Germans believe that the inexorable laws of history are against a permanent continuance of English supremacy.

England and France.

"German humor is again touched by the entente between England and France. The emotional French people dattered by England and buoyed up by the hope of recovering Alsace and Lorraine, are allowing themselves to be used as a buffer against Germany.

"So think the Germans, and the thought is not unpleasant to them. Ready to place a million soldiers in the field on short notice, and possessing the finest military organization the world has ever seen, they believe they could again subdue France, even with more ease than in 1870, thus counteracting the reverses which they would certainly suffer from the English fleet in case of war.

To Crush Germany.

"If some Englishmen mistake the utterance of a few enthusiasts for the deep-seated convictions of the German people, they labor under a great misconception. It is hard to find a German, unless one who has visited England, who is not firmly convinced that the grand aim of the British people is to crush Germany by hook or crook.

Guarantee Blocks.

Mr. R. Bangham, manager of the Ontario Asphalt Block Company, of Windsor, offered to give the firm's guarantee on the blocks. The company had a paid-up capital of \$130,000, and were willing to guarantee the blocks. He was willing to go on a joint bond with Blight & Fielder for the work.

City Engineer Graydon was instructed to make inquiries, and report at the next meeting. The committee will endeavor to tile the creek and drain the street before the winter sets in.

Other Matters.

The claim of Mr. J. F. Faulds, on behalf of Mr. John Crockett, for \$40 for repairs to the Richmond street bridge, was filed.

City Engineer Graydon informed the committee that the septic tanks had been completed for some months. The council will inspect them on Monday afternoon next.

Mr. Wm. Gorman asked for sewer connection on Richmond street north, and on the recommendation of City Engineer Graydon it was decided to initiate a sewer on Richmond street, between Cheapside and Grosvenor streets.
