SELLING OF THE SOUTHWESTERN LINE

It Is Said the Reserve Bid Fixed by the Master-in-Chancery Is \$600,000—If That Amount Is Not Realized the Line Will Be Operated by the Directors.

The traction situation in London seems to be attracting not a little attention of late. The prospective sale of the South western Traction Company has led

outsiders to take an interest in local conditions, and there is as a result much speculation as to the future of more than one road. As mentioned some time ago, there is a local syndicate ready to take over the Southwestern Traction Company next month

Local Men Want Road.

The members are at the present time framing their offer, and it will be made on the day of the sale. It now appears that several other local capitalists are looking into the situation, and it is possible that they may make an offer for the concern. Last week a gentleman from the United States visited the city, and made inquiries regarding the Southwestern Traction Company, the land Counties Railway, the London and .Western Railway, and the London

Centre in London.

These roads all run out of London in different ways, and would centre here. The gentleman was the representative of a large American financial house, it was stated, and it is understood that he was looking into the situation as a possible field for investment of American money. The idea is to amaigamate all the lines running out of the city under one management, and run them in conjuction with the London street rail-

Many Inquiries.

Several gentlemen interested in traction matters admitted today that the number of inquiries regarding the local traction situation had been many and had been diversified. The inquiries came not only from many parts of Canada, but also from the United States. The sale of the Southwestern will attract great interest,

\$600,000 Is Reserve Price.

The up-set price has not been ma de public, but it is understood that it will reach the sum of \$600,000. If that sum is not bid for the road, the bond-holders will take hold of

the proposition and run it themselves It is thought by competent railro ad men that at that figure the concern fine prospect and should pay well

There are also persistent rumors to the effect that the company taking over the Southwestern would also take over the London street railway.

However, little information can be obtained on that score, and it is not likely that anything of a definite na ture will be learned for some time yet.
