For high tea I would suggest the following menu: Oyster chowder in cups, wafers, broiled chicken, potato croquettes, cauliflower, in red apples, cream cheese, crackers, ice cream or fruit salad, coffee. For a late supper: Tomato salad, stuffed with mayonnaise of chicken, plain bread and butter, sandwiches (brown bread one side, white the other), ice cream, cake and coffee. If your guests are for cards, their entertainment is easily solved. If not try some of the clever guessing games used so much.

You might carry out the idea of the tin wedding with a centerpiece of the tin filled with flowers, tin bon-bon dishes, etc. Your prize, too, might be of tin, and cause your guests some amusement.

MARY'S COOK BOOK.

Banana Sponge—Line a mold which has been dipped in cold water with thin crosswise slices of bananas and fill with this mixture. Mix one-half cup cornstarch, one-fourth cup sugar, and a pinch of salt with one-fourth cup cold milk. Add this to four cups hot milk in double boiler and stir until thickens. Cook 15 minutes. Add a teaspoon vanilla. Stir in one cup of eggs beaten stiff. Chill, remove from mold and garnish with candied cherries.

SEND THEM TO CANADA
Royal Colonial Institute Discusses the Emigration Problem.

London, May 30.—A conference of representatives of 44 emigration societies, called by the Royal Colonial Institute, opened yesterday. The conference is to discuss the whole question of emigration, and will attempt to promote schemes for diverting to British colonies the stream of emigration now going outside the empire.

Sir J. B. Edwards, who is presiding over the conference, pointed out in his opening address that last year 110,000 British emigrants went to the United States, while only 86,000 went to Canada, 27,000 to Australia and New Zealand and 23,000 to Cape Colony.

Dr. Wm. Baker, honorary director and chairman of the council of Dr. Barnardo's homes, while admitting the courtesy of the Canadian officials, complained of the indefiniteness of their rules in regard to the emigration of children. The colonial representatives, he said, ought to practice a more definite method of examining children.

Lord Brassey pointed out the desirability of all emigration societies co-operating. He favored a system of co-operation in Australia, South Africa, and Canada. Assistance from national funds, he said, might well be sought.

Lord Dundonald, who opened the discussion, expressed the view that this country neglected the resources which the valor of our ancestors had placed at the disposal of the nation. The emigration problems would be best solved by great centres of population acquiring fertile estates throughout the empire, where they could send those who could not get work in this country. He believed the investment in such estates would be amply remunerative, the prospects being that they would get their money back with 100 per cent increase.

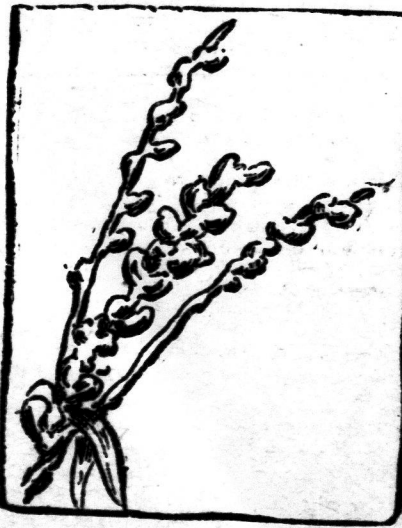
MY PUSSIES.
