

ULSTER WOMEN ARE OPPOSED TO HOME RULE

Marchioness of Dufferin Says It Spells Ruin to the Country.

Belfast, Sept. 30.—The feminine feature of the present anti-home rule agitation in Ulster was brought into prominence tonight when more than 30,000 women attended a demonstration in Ulster Hall. The Dowager Marchioness of Dufferin and Ava presided at the meeting, and in her address declared that she was opposed to home rule, because it would perpetuate the strife between the Irish factions, endanger the people's liberties and financially ruin the country.

Ships For Carson.
Liverpool, Sept. 30.—The demonstrations in support of Ulster in the home rule fight, which continue here, this afternoon culminated in a monster gathering which continued its activities until the evening, when Sir Edward Carson, the leader of the anti-home rule forces, made the principal address. F. E. Smith, one of the prominent English Unionists, also spoke. He declared that the ship-owners of the use of three ships to take ten thousand men to Belfast to participate in the fight against an Irish Parliament.

RIOT AT LAWRENCE

Twelve Thousand Textile Workers Are Now on Strike.

Lawrence, Mass., Sept. 30.—Rioting marked the beginning of the 24-hour general strike of the Industrial Workers of the World as a protest against the imprisonment of Joseph J. Egan and Arturo Giovannitti, leaders of the organization, whose trial on a charge of murder began at Salem today. Fifteen persons were injured and a dozen arrests were made. Of the 20,000 textile operatives employed in the mills of this city 12,000 were estimated to be idle by 11 a.m. Seven thousand of those out were members of the Industrial Workers of the World. The others, who had either remained away from the mills through fear of personal injury or had left because there was no work in their departments.

CHIEF RESIGNS.

HALF OF THE YIELD WILL BE NO. 1 HARD

Ten Times as Much Will Be Threshed in Alberta This Season.

Calgary, Sept. 30.—The quantity of hard wheat threshed in Alberta this year will be ten times as much as last year. The prospect is that at least half of the 1912 crop will grade No. 1 hard, and No. 1 and 2 northern.

Up to date, George Hill, Government grain inspector, has inspected more than half as much No. 1 hard as was marketed altogether last year. Only two cars of No. 1 hard white flint, which sells in Winnipeg as No. 1 northern, were shipped from Calgary in 1911, but three cars of this particular wheat were inspected here during the current month.

It is estimated that the total output of first grade wheat this year will be about three hundred carloads, as compared with 281 carloads in 1911. The yield in this immediate vicinity this year is only slightly greater than that of last year.

HOPES FOR BEST

Burton Gibson Arraigned for Alleged Murder of His Client.

Goshen, N. Y., Sept. 30.—"I hope for the best," was the brief statement made this morning by Burton W. Gibson, the New York lawyer, before being arraigned in court here, charged with the murder of his erstwhile client, Mrs. Rosa Menschik Szabo. Mrs. Szabo met death while boating with Gibson in Greenwood Lake, this county, and the county authorities maintain that she was strangled, not drowned.

Mrs. Gibson held a conference with her husband before court opened and will sit near him through the proceedings.

ENTERS AN APPEAL

Brewer Was Fined for Selling to Hotelman in Dry District.

Kingston, Sept. 30.—John Fisher, a brewer, appealed before Judge Price this morning from the decision of County Magistrate Hunter and Bradshaw, who fined him \$20 and costs on a charge of selling beer to Charles Fralick. Fralick is now in jail for disposing of liquor in a local option township. The fine was levied on the evidence of Provincial Inspector Morrison, who swore before the magistrates that Fralick told him that Fisher had sold the liquor. Before Judge Price both Fralick and his wife swore that Fisher did not sell and the judge quashed the conviction.

SUICIDED IN JAIL.

Sherbrooke, Que., Sept. 30.—Samuel Madeline hanged himself from the bars of the jail on Saturday night. He was sentenced to two years in Vincent de Paul for horse stealing, and was to have been sent there this morning. He was 29 years of age.

Young Bank Clerk at Cobalt May Lose His Arm.

Cobalt, Sept. 30.—While Clarence Byers, teller in the Bank of Toronto here, was placing a loaded gun in his canoe on Saturday, the trigger caught on the side of the canoe, the gun exploding, the charge lodging in Byers' right forearm and breast. The accident happened at Latchford. Byers was brought to the local hospital and it is feared he may lose his arm.

"The Third Degree."

"The Third Degree," a strong drama written by Charles Klein, author of "The Man and the Mouse," was presented at the Grand Opera House last evening, attracting a medium-sized audience. It is needless to say that the play lived up to its reputation. It was a thrilling drama, well enacted. Its popularity is by no means on the wane. Strong situations fairly crowded upon one another, holding the audience breathless from beginning to end. The finish is not convincing, however, and is the only portion of the construction of the play subject to criticism whatever.

The theme of the play centres about the police force in large American cities and its iniquitous inquisition, and the tyranny of a certain kind of yellow press. A young man, a member of the exclusive set marries beneath his station, and is disinherited. Later a shooting occurs, and the young fellow is arrested for the murder of his friend. He is given "the third degree," and a confession is wrung from him, by the police. The young wife intercedes for him, and finally persuades Richard Brewster, the lawyer for her husband's family, to defend him. The working of the police system in certain cities is shown up in its horridness, and the young man is acquitted, and reconciled to his friends.

The cast is fairly well chosen. Miss Adele Hughes, who plays the part of the young wife, is a hard-working actress, with marked ability. She did justice to the role in every particular, and lived up to the strongest situations.

"The Siren" Tonight.

Donald Brian, in the role of a young marquis, who is suspected of having written letters derogatory to the throne, but who fails to succumb to the wiles of a score of sirens employed by the minister of police to secure a specimen of his handwriting, and instead falls victim to the innocent plot of a little country girl, has never been more happily cast than in "The Siren," the musical comedy success in which Charles Frohman will present him at the Grand tonight. Composer and librettists have supplied him with the most haunting of songs and the most bewitching of music to the rhythm of which his peculiar grace is well fitted. He fairly dances through the whole three acts, and in most of his Terpsichorean work he has a partner in every way worthy of the artistic honor, Miss Julia Sanderson.
