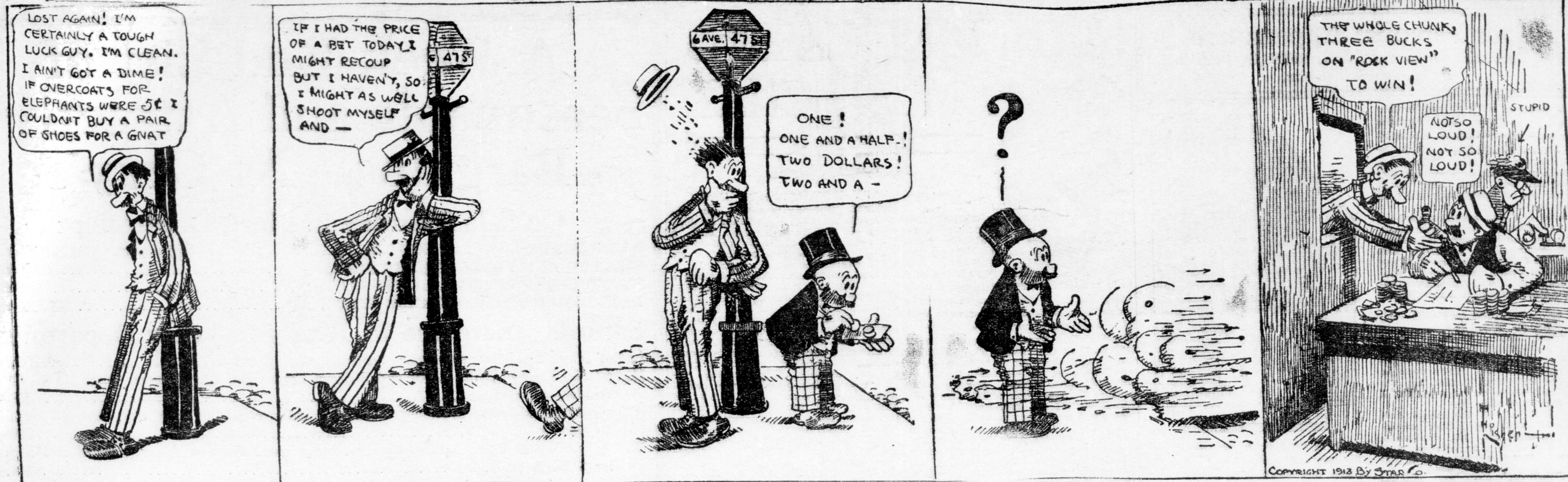

London Rink Finishes Second In D. B. A. Consolation Event

Allen, of Thistles Was Beaten Out in the Semi-Finals of the Ontario Cup and in the Finals of the Toronto Cup.

TORONTO, Aug. 14.—W. D. Euler, of Berlin, easily defeated A. G. Darling, of Montreal, yesterday afternoon in the final match for the Walker Trophy, the chief prize of the Dominion Lawn Bowling Association's annual tournament on the Victoria lawn. Only fourteen ends were played, and the score was 22 to 8 in favor of the western rink, whose victory was generally anticipated, and was most popular. The Montreal players got off to a fine start, when they got three shots on the first end, but Euler tied the score in the second end, and was never thereafter in danger. Darling scored only four of the fourteen ends.

The Ontario Cup was won by Dr. Paul, of Canada, after one of the closest and most interesting struggles ever seen in a tournament match. G. S. Pearcey, Victoria, going down to defeat in the finals by 11 to 10 after an extra end, and the winning shot was only decided after measurement, a quarter of an inch separating the winning bowl and one of the opposing rink.

While the semi-finals of the Ontario Cup did not furnish the excitement of the final match, one of the games was interesting. In this match, Dr. Paul, of Canada, J. G. Darling, of Montreal, 12 to 10, the local player getting two shots in the first end. In the other semi-final game, G. S. Pearcey, Victoria, won from F. Allen, of London Thistles, by 17 to 12.

Allen, of London Thistles, went into the finals of the Toronto Cup, but was beaten out, by the close score of 10 to 9, by Rev. J. Muir, of Rusholme.
