New York, March 6 .- Maritime circles have received advices that the passengers and crew of La Touraine are safe. She has aboard 38 first-cabin passengers and 43 in the steerage.

Aboard the Touraine when she sailed last Saturday were 4.494 cases of cartridges, intended for use in the European war. NOT CONFIRMED.

At the local offices of the French Line it was said this morning that no information regarding the Touraine had been received.
