

BIG MAJORITY FOR HOSPITAL IN ST. THOMAS

With Light Poll, Vote Was Nearly Two to One for Scheme.

START BUILDING SOON

[Special to The Advertiser.] ST. THOMAS, Nov. 14.—By a majority of 461 the ratepayers today voted in favor of a bylaw providing for a grant of \$100,000 toward the erection of an Elgin Memorial Hospital.

The poll was exceedingly light, less than one-half of the ratepayers entitled to vote casting ballots. All told, the ratepayers numbered 2,500, and out of these only 1,425 visited the polling booths.

Each of the 15 subdivisions, except one, gave majorities, many of them substantial, in favor of the project. The special pole instituted for the railwaymen gave a majority against the bylaw.

The members of the Kiwanis Club acted as scrutineers and were also responsible for bringing many people to the poll.

Off the List.

Many complaints have been registered by people whose names were omitted from the list as property owners and who, as a result, were not able to vote. Among the protesters was ex-Mayor Horton, chairman of the hospital board and one of the promoters of the project.

It was explained by Assessment Commissioner Freek that the list made in 1919 was used on Monday, as the 1920 list has not been revised. The latter, however, will be used in the municipal elections in January.

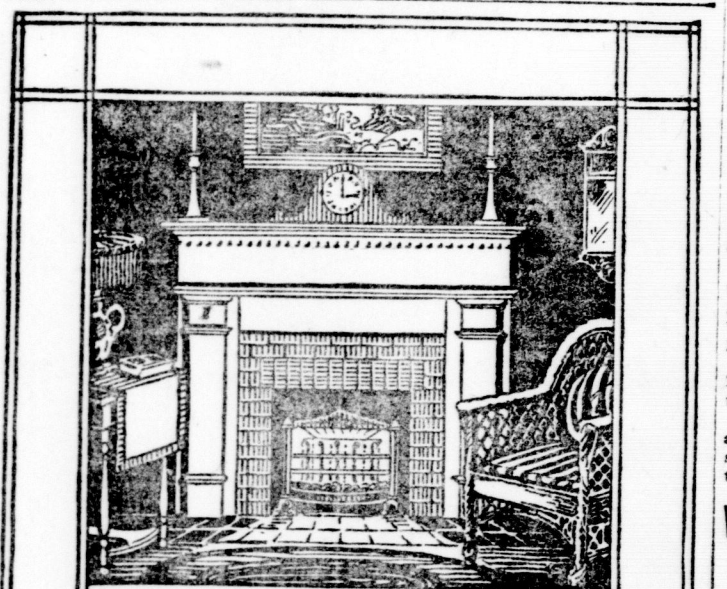
Additional funds will be secured, it is expected.

TALK OF BURYING PEACE NEWS BEARER IN CANADA

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—(By Canadian Press).—The body of Albert Miller, Canadian war veteran, who died in Buffalo on Armistice Day, and who is credited with carrying the "cease fire" message from British headquarters at Mons the day the armistice was signed, will be brought to Canada for burial by the Great War Veterans' Association if investigation shows that the facts warrant the action. Dominion's Fort Erie branch is making a complete investigation of the whole case, as the "Virginia B" selling their wares from a false-bottom trunk. CROWN FAILED TO PRODUCE WITNESS

Magistrate Dismisses Perjury Charge Against Port Stanley Man.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 14.—After five times appearing in the local police court for hearing, and after a wild-goose chase of several weeks' duration on the part of the crown, who sought the whereabouts of Frank Cosley, a Port Stanley fisherman, who is supposed to be reposing somewhere behind prison walls because he was convicted of bootlegging several weeks ago, the perjury charge against J. E. Jones, a South Yarmouth farmer, was dismissed by Magistrate Maxwell, Monday.

The reason for the delay, as given by Crown-Attorney McCrimmon, was an odd one, for although the wanderings of the star witness in the case were limited by stone walls, the chase led him and thither, and in the end the case was dismissed without his appearance.

On being sentenced to six months' imprisonment for selling liquor illegally, Cosley is alleged to have made a statement to License Inspector Ross which led to the charge of perjury against Jones.

When the case came up for hearing efforts were made to bring Cosley to court to substantiate the charge. But, although Cosley was supposed to have been taken to Burwash from the county jail, inquiries made there by Mr. McCrimmon elicited the information that the prisoner was at Guelph. He arrived at Guelph, but then learned that Cosley was at Mimico. Last week he made formal application for his return from Mimico, but learned that he had been removed from that place. His whereabouts were not given.

"I admit that I have been unintentionally delinquent in this matter," Crown-Attorney McCrimmon told the court, "and I speak with the utmost candor when I say that I don't know whether I should be able to succeed with the charge if it is heard. At the present time I have no corroboration of Cosley's evidence. I will not take any exception in any action that your worship may deem it advisable to take in the matter."

In dismissing the charge, the magistrate said he would not give much credence to anything that Cosley might state, under oath, without corroboration.

The \$1,500 liquor endorsement, which has been under litigation for so long, still remains in the possession of the authorities until Judge Ermathner has delivered his judgment in the appeal against Magistrate Maxwell's decision, which was heard by the judge nearly two months ago. After hearing the evidence submitted in the liquor seizure case, Magistrate Maxwell found for J. E. Jones, the claimant. The appeal was entered by Crown-Attorney McCrimmon.

Questioned Monday, Judge Ermathner stated that he will deliver his judgment in a few days. He has been withholding his findings until the perjury charge had been disposed of.

Barrister J. M. McEvoy, K. C., of London, appeared for Jones throughout the entire proceedings.

As the case adjourned peremptorily at the last hearing, Mr. McCrimmon stated that he did not feel in a position to demand another adjournment.

WANTED ELSEWHERE ON JAIL-BREAKING CHARGE

Chatham Prisoner, of Many Aliases, Says Toronto Is Home.

CHATHAM, Nov. 14.—Basil McMeekin, alias Gordon Smith, alias Harold Doyle, alias John Bell, who escaped from the Chatham jail last July, and who was brought back to Chatham a few days ago by Provincial Detective Finlay Lowe, is wanted in Hanover, Ont., on a charge of breaking jail, according to advices received by the county police from Toronto this morning.

It is alleged that on the way up to Chatham from Windsor, Smith became communicative and dropped one or two hints which Detective Lowe followed up. On Saturday last he went to the county jail and put one or two questions to Smith. To the officer's surprise Smith gave in and told all the information that was required. His real name is said to be Basil McMeekin, and his home at 126 Ontario street, Toronto.

ST. THOMAS POPPY DAY VENDORS REALIZE \$2,700

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 11.—Approximately \$2,700 was the net proceeds from the sale of poppies on the streets of this city during the last few days of the past week. Of this amount \$1,400 goes toward the relief of orphans and other unfortunate in France.

It is claimed by those who were in charge of the campaign that St. Thomas greatly exceeded all other cities in the Dominion according to its population, both in the number of poppies procured and sold. President Gladstone Whitworth of the G. W. V. A. has expressed great pleasure at the proven generosity of the people of the city.

The exact amount realized from the sale will be announced Monday night next.

LABOR SITUATION BECOMES BRIGHTER

Improves in St. Thomas When M. C. R. Reinstates Men.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 14.—With 39 employees reinstated by the M. C. R. over the week-end and the P. M. R. contemplating several additions to their local staff during the week, the labor situation in this city has taken on a much brighter aspect.

According to the local officials of the M. C. R., a total of 30 mechanics and mechanics' helpers have been added to the engine department and other shifts. The P. M. R. will, it is expected, add 15 men to its strength bringing conditions on that road almost back to normalcy.

The M. C. R., while practically working with the same strength as before the outbreak of the war, is still not quite up to the mark established in 1917 and 1919. The Wabash and Grand Trunk are almost in as good shape as the P. M. R.

In other industries of the city, there have been slight tendencies toward speeding up activities. The staff of the Canada Iron Foundries, Limited, has been increased by a few men this month and another small increase is expected next month. On the whole, the management report, the outlook is very much better than it was last year.
