## Churches of Empire Are Urged To Call Peace Council in London

LONDON, Sept. 7.—(By Canadian Press Cable.)—Following a remarkable peace sermon by the Archbishop of Canterbury at Geneva on Sunday comes an appeal for immediate action by a wellknown church leader, Dr. Jowett, who, in the British Weekly, declares that the world is drifting again to war. He urges the churches, Protestant, Roman and Greek, to arise from their slumbers

and ward off the approaching catastrophe.

Dr. Jowett suggests that representative leaders of the Christian church meet in councils of peace in every nation, and adds: "Let us have a council of peace in London with delegates from every part of the empire; let the delegates be distinguished Christian men, not drawn merely from the ranks of ecclesiastics, but the wider realm of commerce, art, literature and labor. Let us have a three-days' council at the heart of the empire, not merely to make speeches but to visualize and demonstrate the existence of the corporate body which has in its custody the morals and ideals of Christ and to emphasize the intention to give them their due sovereignty in the reconstruction of the world."


