## CAVARY IS SENIOR TO OTHER UNITS

General King Declares Horses and General Horsemanship Are Still First.

Expressing his satisfaction on the splendid showing of the officers and men of the First Hussars, who assembled for inspection at the armouries last night at 8:15, General King, D.S.O., C.M.G., general officer commanding military district No. 1, complimented the troops on their excellent performance.

General King said that he hoped the near future would bring a larger government grant, which would enable the regiment to be carried on half to full strength. He knew that the hearts of the officers and men were in their work, else they would not have shown the improvement evidenced by the last few months' training.

The general urged the men to keep a pal in mind for the time when recruiting would be carried on, so that they could bring their friends in when the time arrived, adding that he hoped that next year he would have the pleasure of meeting the same men again.

In conclusion, General King emphasized that the cavalry branch of the service is senior in Canada, and that the regiment is a mechanical device which entered into military matters, horses and horsemanship occupied as high a place as ever.

Three rousing cheers for the general were then given.

Following General King's address, Lieutenant-Colonel, who commanded the Light Horse overseas, spoke to the officers and men of the First Hussars, complimenting them on their splendid mount.

The inspection included manoeuvres. Two squadrons, A and B, were moved in section and troop formation.

After the inspection the roll was called.

The following officers were present: General King, Col. C. H. Leonard, D.S.O.; Capt. J. Wood, R.C.D.; First Hussars; Lieutenant-Col. F. A. Taylor, D.S.O.; Col. J. H. Leonard, D.S.O.; Major E. B. West, Capt. R. C. Crouch, Capt. J. P. Lucas, Lieutenant-Quartermaster S. Warner, Lieutenant, S. Warner, Lieutenant, R. C. Crouch, Lieutenant, R. C. Crouch.

The First Hussars band, under Lieutenant D. Cooke, was in attendance, and the band played martial airs during the inspection.

The inspection finished the season's training of the regiment. The members are now through until next year.

## GREET FISH DAY

National Event Meets With Fair Reception in London.

Canada's national fish day is meeting with a moderately good reception in the city today, according to local fish dealers. While no special preparations seem to have been made by London cafes and restaurants in the way of supplying special fish dishes for the day, the private housewives have observed the day to some extent. The national fish day was inaugurated with the idea of making popular to the people living in the inland provinces and has been in existence since the middle war years.

It is stated by some of the fish men that the day has been set too late in the season and that by this time most people are tired of eating fish. They believe that it should be held about the summer time in future, if the best results are to be achieved.

## BOY SCOUT CAMPAIGN IS NEARING OBJECTIVE

Large Amount Already Collected in Drive Throughout City.

The boy scout financial campaign in the city is progressing favorably. A large amount having been collected and another day remaining to swell the collections to \$5,000.

This was the favorable statement of the committee last night, who said that the scouts were working with energetic co-operation to make the campaign one of the greatest drives of the kind ever held in this city.

Similar campaigns have been successful in Toronto, Brantford, Chatham, Stratford, Hamilton and Windsor, and the scouts are positive that London can do just as well.

The spirit of the boy scout movement in the city is evidenced in the fact that on the "Scoutmaster" or yellow envelope which is delivered to every house and business office in London, are printed the words, "A special message is delivered to you by a boy scout."

Continuing, the Scoutmaster reads that the boy scouts themselves are self-sufficient, but funds are needed to maintain the organization which supervises and extends to boy scout movement.

Fitting services have been arranged to celebrate the 51st anniversary of Cronyn Memorial church next Sunday. The choir has prepared a new service of praise for the congregational social Monday night.
